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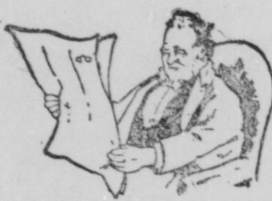

**HOW SECTIONALISM IS
PROVOKED.**

One of the expedients adopted by Mr. Israel Tarte and his paper, La Patrie, with a view to promoting what is known as the race cry, was to print and circulate garbled, and sometimes forged, citations from the Ontario press reflecting offensively upon our French-Canadian friends. The Mail and Empire was the victim to some extent of this dishonest practice. In a pamphlet issued by Mr. Tarte a few days before the general election we find The Mail and Empire figuring quite prominently as an "insulter of our race." Language is attributed to this journal that was never used by it. Opinions that it never uttered, but, on the contrary, combated, are coolly laid at its door. There is no remedy for this sort of mischief. It is idle to protest. All that can be done is to regret that men who are old enough to know better should descend to work of this class. Our contemporary the Chatham Planet has just had an experience of the Tarte campaign. In common with other papers on both sides of politics, it publishes what is technically known as "plate" matter consisting of selections and stories of a light character. This matter comes to the papers in stereotype blocks, and is used without any political intent. A few weeks ago the "plate" matter contained a child's story about a couple of pigs that wanted to be men. Embedded in this yarn was an attempted joke to the effect that pigs speak French, because they say "oui, oui." No serious French-Canadian would mind that. Reading the story he would laugh at it. Certainly the Chatham Planet, which is a decidedly high-class paper, would not think for a moment of printing an offensive allusion to any race, English or French, Irish or Scotch. But La Patrie, Mr. Tarte's firebrand journal found the pig story in the children's corner of the Planet, and out of it this little joke was extracted for publication, with the added comment: "This insulting and ill-timed article is over a column long." "The Chatham Planet is a Tory organ, supporting Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foste." The suggestion was plain; La Patrie professed to be giving only a little bit of the insult which Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster were offering to the race via the Planet. From Tarte's paper the story was transferred to the Soleil, Mr. Pacaud's journal. The Soleil is very serious about it. It says:—"We have hesitated to make known to our readers the insults cast at them daily by English Conservative papers. They are of a nature, we think calculated to stir up between the two races an antagonism so unfortunate, so prejudicial to peace and harmony, and to the general prosperity of the country. But as one of our confreres of the French language has 'not observed the same reserves we believe our obligation cancelled. "One may judge of the fury of all these Tories by the comparison of the French-Canadian to a pig." From the Soleil the story went to the Montreal Herald, and from that paper it passed to the Toronto Globe, which publication endorsed the "insult" theory, with a view to strengthening Mr. Tarte's hand. It is preposterous that a political party should be accused of pursuing and reviling an important section of our population on the strength of a little extract from "plate" matter that was published in Liberal as well as Conservative papers, and

that had not political or intentionally offensive meaning in either case. It is a pity that so much expenditure in promoting ill feeling where the best of good feeling ought to prevail.—stail and Empire.

CHAMBERLAIN'S VIEW.

Mr. Chamberlain has made a speech at a banquet given by the Fishmongers, in which he predicts that the British nation will enter on a new chapter with the new century, and that its title will be "The Unity of the Empire." He claims that a new birth has already taken place. The old colonial system fell with the American revolution, because, in the opinion of Mr. Chamberlain, it does not deserve to survive. After this, colonies became unpopular, and there was a widespread opinion that they would and ought to become independent. The new state of things is to treat the colonies as equals; the great self-governing colonies, in the South African war, sent of their own accord, assistance in upholding the cause of the Empire. "We recognize," says Mr. Chamberlain, "that all these varied people have become one family. We recognize that their good is ours, and that our strength is theirs."
