King's County Wins Debate

Bear River Junior Farmers, representing King's County, won a close decision over Vernon River Children of Mary Society at Dundas on Thursday last.

The Vernon River team, Jean O'Donnell, Marie Duffy and Margaret Rosoh upheld the affirmative side of the debate and were opposed by James Whelan, Martina Hughes and Bernice McGough of Bear River.

The subject debated, "Resolved that the Cooperative Movement offers greater possibilities for peace and prosperity than competitive trade," was ably debated by both teams. All points were presented well and the subject was completely covered; however, the judges stated in criticism that the Queen's County representatives did not stick as close to the subject as the winners but spoke too much on complementary angles.

The judges, Mrs. Norman MacMillan, Albert Plains; Mr. Robert LeClair, B.A., P. W. C. professor, and Mr. Edward MacPhail, Director of the Correspondence Branch, Department of Education, were not all agreed that the Junior Farmers were superior, but on totalling the scoring they had an

Q: What benefits does the hospital plan provide?


