Refused Bail In Securities Theft

MONTREAL (CP)—Two young men, charged with theft of \$700,000 in securities and with conspiracy, were refused bail on arraignment in criminal court Friday despite requests by their counsel.

Gary Hart, 21, and Constantine Pa-adakis, 22, were remanded in custody until Jan. 4 for preliminary hearing. Neither was asked to enter a plea.

Judge Guy Gault refused bail because of the amount involved in the charges and because of "disastrous repercussions" on the stock-brokerage firm concerned.

The firm of R. Moat and Co. voluntarily went into bankruptcy when the theft was discovered two weeks ago.

Each was charged specifically with stealing and conspiring to steal \$700,000 worth of stock certificates within the last 18 months.

Benjamin Simms, 31, employee of another Montreal brokerage firm who was found with Hart in Florida, returned voluntarily to Montreal and has been questioned by police.

The investigation by insurance companies, with which \$150,000 worth of the securities was involved, is headed by Leo J. Leclerc.

Meanwhile, police said they believe at least \$300,000 in cash has been realized through sale or trade to legitimate brokerage houses of the stolen securities and that the money "has been cached somewhere."

REBELS STILL ACTIVE RANGOON, BURMA Reuters—Burmese officials reported Thursday new battles by armed Karen rebels. Officials said more than 3000 raided the town of Tantabin Monday and that one person was killed and several wounded.

CHINESE, MALAYANS CLASH HONG KONG (Reuters)—Chinese workers clashed with Malayan employees at the British Malayan Petroleum Company Wednesday night. One Chinese was killed and about 10 persons were wounded.

Paul Waner Is Critically Ill SARASOTA, Fla. (AP)—Paul Waner, a member of the baseball Hall of Fame, was reported in critical condition Thursday with pneumonia.

AUSSIES HONORED In a special Australian honors list the Queen conferred membership in the Order of the British Empire on Peter Thomson, three-gold champion, and on hurdler Shirley de la Hunty.

Mrs. de la Hunty, 31, better known by her maiden name of Shirley Strickland, won a gold medal at the Melbourne Olympics in the 80-metre hurdles with a world record time of 1:27 seconds.

The British Empire Medal was also given to the eight Australians who worked hard to get the Olympics off to a good start.

Atom Scientists Included In New Year's Honours List

LONDON (AP)—Two Britons who have contributed to atomic development were singled out for high recognition in the New Year's honors list announced by the Queen.

Sir John Cockcroft, director of the Harwell atomic energy project who is credited with being the first man to split the atom by mechanical means, won the Order of Merit—Britain's most treasured distinction.

Limited to 24 living members, Sir Christopher Hinton was made a Knight Commander of the British Empire. The 55-year-old scientist is the acknowledged driving force behind Britain's expanding peacetime atomic power program.

Two new barons Queen Elizabeth also created two new barons and handed out 33 knighthoods as well as a host of lesser accolades for services in a wide range of endeavor.

Two sports figures, Donald Campbell, the world water speed recordholder, and Stanley Matthews, "grand old man" of soccer, both were named companions of the Order of the British Empire.

Matthews, still an active player for his league club and for England, gets no title from the award. But an expectation he will be knighted when he finally retires from the game.

The award to Matthews, showing the young monarch's interest in sport, followed years of clamor in Britain for some national recognition of the sporting idol, now 41, who has played 51 times for England's national team and is probably known to more people in the world than any other sports figure.

Campbell, who set a record of 225.63 miles an hour on Lake Coniston last September, is the 33-year-old son of the late speed king Sir Malcolm Campbell.

Knighthoods were conferred on Edward Hulton, publisher of Picture Post and other magazines, and Henry (Chips) Channon, 59, who has the reputation of being Britain's best-dressed member of Parliament.

Viscount Harcourt, financial adviser at the British embassy in Washington, was made Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael.

Paul Waner, 53, had been active and had planned to play in an old timers game at St. Petersburg Jan. 19. A batting instructor for the Milwaukee Braves farm system, he made his name playing with Pittsburgh Pirates but also played with the old Boston Braves and New York Yankees.

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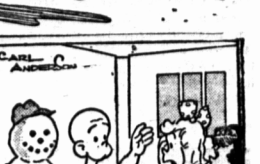
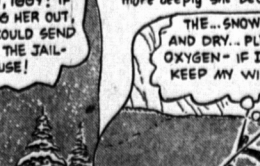
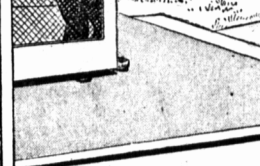
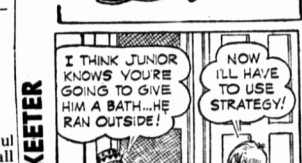

CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. North-South vulnerable.

Opening lead—jack of clubs. Harold Ogust, who is a member of the American team which will be playing for the world title next week in New York against the Italian team, has built himself quite a reputation as a tough bridge competitor.

He is not an easy man to play against. Ogust is in the bidding on nearly every hand, and it is hard for the opponents to tell when he has his values and when he hasn't. Despite this verbosity he is, miraculously enough, seldom caught off base. He has a good ear for the bidding that goes on, knows when to duck for cover, and succeeds frequently in leading the opposition astray.

In the play, whether as declarer or defender, Ogust is equally agile. His technique and strategy are exercised so smoothly that the opponents usually are not aware that anything untoward has happened until after the event.

Here is a hand in which he played the role of a defender in a recent rubber bridge game. Ogust was East. The jack of clubs won the opening lead and two more club tricks were rapidly cashed. East returned the ten of diamonds which declarer won in his own hand.

South cashed the king of hearts, and Ogust promptly played the nine. Declarer naturally assumed that the nine was either a singleton or that East had J-9 alone. To protect against the possibility the nine was alone and that West might have started with J-7-6-3, in which case the jack was finessable, South continued with the queen. West showed out and East now had a trump trick, the setting trick.

Had Ogust played the six or seven on the king, declarer would have had no alternative but to play a low trump to the ace. This would have subjected East's jack to capture, and made the contract.

Maybe declarer shouldn't have been fooled, but the fact is that without the nine play South cannot go wrong, while with the appearance of the nine a genuine problem is created. That's what we mean by "tough bridge competitor."
