

**NEW ORPHANAGE VISITED**—The handsome new Protestant Orphanage was visited on Wednesday last by about one hundred ladies of the Auxiliary, who motored out, taking with them treats of ice cream and cake for the children, whom they visited at the old Orphanage. A striking contrast was noticed between the two buildings and no doubt the children themselves are looking eagerly forward to getting into their new home. The various rooms of the new Orphanage were inspected by the visiting ladies, who were charmed with the splendid arrangement of everything.

## Modern Psychiatry Was Subject of Address By Dr. Goodwill

"Some Trends of Modern Psychiatry" was the subject of a most interesting paper read by Dr. Goodwill, Medical Superintendent of Falconwood Hospital, at the Rotary Luncheon yesterday afternoon.

The Doctor first dealt historically with the development of this science, pointing out that in the middle ages it was a common belief that Divine and Diabolical spirits ruled the body resulting in exorcism, torture of and persecuting the body, and the resorting to holy wells and shrines for relief. As this practice proved ineffectual we have the chain and dungeon era, the belief in the "evil eye" and witchcraft caused many to be burned at the stake as witches.

The Doctor then traced the development of the science from 100 years ago when the sufferers from mental ills came to be recognized as mental problems. First old monasteries were utilized, all classes being confined together, and restraints being used, in fact, ignorance, mistrust, the effect of the moon, and belief in evil spirits still prevailed up to and during the 18th Century. As the medical aspect became more appreciated there developed a gradual change in the character of such institutions. The term "Psychiatry" has arisen during the past 25 years, and the terms "insanity," "lunacy," "Mad-house" etc., relics of the past era began to be eliminated as being detrimental to this last problem. The Doctor appealed to all to refrain from using these terms, either by the spoken or the printed word. We have now in many places the "Psychopathic" and Reception Hospital with its large staff of trained workers, clinical directions, pathologist, bacteriologist, consulting physicians and surgeons which has resulted in making the lot of those under care more careful and a clearer idea of the nature of such conditions to be spread abroad. He pointed out that it was the earnest and devoted work of men who gave modern "Psychiatry" that brought about this transformation. He then dealt with the treatment of three groups which are receiving "Psychiatric" treatment to-wit: (1) Mentals (2) Those who are diseased and (3) Those who are demented and degenerating. For the first he emphasized the need of proper training, protection and special institutions and the extension of the physical examination of school children. He said the second group brings us in contact with a more distinct medical problem. As a matter of fact most of the causes of mental derangement are situated below the chin, as all organs and tissues of the body act and react upon each other through the influence of the sympathetic nervous system. The Doctor also dealt with the causes of mental disturbance the treatment of patients, and other phases of modern "Psychiatry."

Dr. J. J. McMillan, the Vice President, who was in the chair today conveyed the thanks of the Club to Dr. Goodwill.

The guests present were Mr. Milton R. Dingwell, and Mr. B. W. LePage, M. P. P., Rotarian Gorbell announced that William Jessop, Foreign Work Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. would speak Friday night in the city, and invited all Rotarians to attend.

Rotarian Commander Lewin announced that 800 men from the H. M. S. Raleigh will be here next week, and suggested that Rotarians should assist in the entertainment on Saturday. A Band Concert, sports, etc., were suggested. The matter was discussed by Rotarians Pomeroy, Turner and others, and a Transportation Committee consisting of W. K. Rogers, J. A. Webster and R. E. Coun. Connors said the length of time in which Marshal Cameron has faithfully performed his duties goes to prove that he has indeed an ideal officer. As a boy he recalled "Charlie" as an outstanding figure on the police force. He was never harsh or brutal in his treatment but yet he inspired terror in the wrong doer. The glance of his eye, and the commanding tone of his voice, had an effect that possibly more brutal measures would not have. His length of honorable service on the force is the speaker believed without parallel. If the Marshal seems fit to retire he would warmly approve of him doing so on full pay. He has richly earned it and the only trouble will be to get another officer of his stamp and ability. "Whether he remains in the service or retires to private life I hope he will be with us long for his genial smile and hearty hand shake will always be looked for."

## Commissioner McKenna

Mr. John McKenna, Water Commissioner and former member of the Council added his words of congratulation and appreciation. He believed it would be a grave mistake to retire Marshal Cameron, because his very presence on the force is a safeguard for better citizenship. However, he was certainly in a position to retire on full pay if he desired and the council could do no better than grant this in recognition of his faithful services.

Marshal Cameron Replies.

In reply to the addresses and presentation Marshal Cameron replied that he had been taken completely by surprise. He thanked His Worship, the members of the Council and Mr. McKenna for their kind expressions of appreciation. He did not claim that he had done anything more than his duty during his period of service but he had always tried to do this fairly and honestly—not harshly at all. He had nothing further to say but to again express his thanks at the kind remembrance of his anniversary.

Warm applause greeted the Chief's modest reply and after informal congratulatory words and handshakes the meeting adjourned.

## MAJOR TRUE ONCE MEMBER CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

REGINA Sask., June 15—Major Ronald True, whose respite from the death sentence for the killing of Gertrude Yates, has created a storm of protests in newspapers in England, enlisted in the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, now the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, in July, 1913, and deserted the force in September of the same year.

His record with the mounted police was far from brilliant, according to officers interviewed to-day. He never advanced above the status of third class constable and during his brief term of service was in the orderly room on different occasions for breaches of discipline.

## Wills Atter Jack Dempsey's Title

NEW YORK, June 15—Paddy Mullins, manager of Harry Wills, the negro boxer, today formally challenged Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, to a contest for the title, and posted a \$2,500 forfeit with the New York State Boxing Commission in accordance with its regulations. Whether the commission would permit such a mixed bout was not decided.

A delegation of colored sportsmen, including George Moore, of Oregon, was told that when such a match was made the commission "would follow the usual procedure," but would not pass upon the matter in advance.
