Spy Who Says He's Canadian Is Reported To Be Russian

LONDON (CP)—The Soviet spy who still insists he is Canadian-born Gordon Arnold Lonsdale is in fact a Russian whose mother still lives in Moscow, says The People, a Sunday newspaper.

Lonsdale, who was caught by British intelligence agents in 1961 and later swapped for British businessman Greville Wynne, has been disclosing features of his spy career in a number of articles written for The People, which claimed it marked the first time a Soviet agent has ever told his story to a Western newspaper.

In the latest episode published this week, Lonsdale maintained he really was born at Cobalt, Ont., in 1924 and he had no difficulty entering the United States from Canada.

However, at the time of the Lonsdale trial, British intelligence maintained he was Koon Trofimovich Molody, a Russian who had been sent from Moscow to spy on military secrets in the U.S. and Britain.

In an accompanying article headlined "Lonsdale's one great lie," The People said in a scry by Ken Gardner in his many meetings with the spy that the reply always was "I am Gordon Lonsdale."

MOTHER LIVES IN FLAT

However, after an investigation in a number of countries, Gardner was able to confirm Lonsdale was Molody, "whose mother, Evdokia Constantinovna Naumova, is still living at flat 67, 16-20 Zubovskiy Boulevard in Moscow."

Molody was taken by an aunt to live in California for five years as a child so that he could attend a North American school.

Gardner said he also looked up Dr. Elmer Mitchell, now living in retirement in Toronto, who had attended the birth of the original Gordon Lonsdale. He had circumcised the baby. The spy, who was caught in

Returning To Space Capsule Said Tougher

MOSCOW (AP)—It was easy getting out of Voskhod II into space but tough coming back in, Soviet space stroller Alexei Leonov said here.

"First, I had more work to do," he told a press conference at the Baikonur Cosmodrome. "I was slightly tired but everything ended well."

"According to the program, I should have wound the rope (lifeline attached to the spacecraft) around my hand and return in that way. But I saw it would take a long time. I thought and an idea came to me how to do it quickly."

He did not elaborate. While Moscow television showed his exit and manoeuvres outside the spacechase last Thursday it did not show his re-entry.

Leonov and his fellow cosmonaut, Pavel Beliyev, disclosed also they landed in a dense forest with Voskhod II sinking gently into deep snow traced by rabbit and fox trails.

ANCIENT MAN Discovery Made In New Mexico

NEW YORK (AP)—Scientists may be one step closer to solving the mystery of the Folsom man, who roamed this continent 10,000 years ago.

Construction work in suburban Albuquerque, recently turned up what may be the beginning of a major archaeological find—ancient stone implements and fragments of flint points chipped and fluted in the typical Folsom manner. Plans now are being made for a full scale excavation on behalf of the University of New Mexico and New York's Museum of Natural History.

Supervising the project will be Dr. Frank Hibben, professor of anthropology at the University of New Mexico.

The first evidence of a stone-age civilization on this continent came to light less than 40 years ago in Folsom, N.M., where archeologists found handmade flint points near the fossils of bison believed extinct for thousands of years.

In 1941, Dr. Hibben found typical Folsom points at Chinita Bay on the Gulf of Alaska. This discovery, in the opinion of Dr. Hibben and other scholars, substantiated the theory that Folsom man originated in Asia and travelled the long overland route to New Mexico.

Fellowships Are Offered

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canada Council has offered 34 fellowships to professors and other staff members of Canadian Universities to help them take up to a year of their teaching and other duties to concentrate on research.

The post-doctoral research fellowships have an average value of \$4,000 to \$4,500, plus travel.

Dear Mr. Becker: It is a long time since I wrote you, but you may recall that on several occasions I have sent you hands to hear out my contention that I am the greatest bridge player in the world!

It is true that my name cannot be found inscribed on any of the trophies emblematic of national or world supremacy, but it is none the less a fact that no player on earth can equal or excel my extraordinary feats at the bridge table. The only trouble is that all my wonderful bids and plays occur while I am asleep, the plain truth being

that when I am awake I am an ordinary and erratic player.

As proof of my prowess while I am in the Land of Nod, I submit this hand which occurred last night. I held the West cards and had to choose a lead against four hearts.

It is difficult to imagine any way of defeating this contract, but I assure you that I accomplished this feat without batting an eyelash. I did not fall into the trap of leading the jack of spades, as most players would, but led the queen of clubs instead!

Now imagine, if you will, being in declarer's shoes at this moment. He naturally thought I had the Q-J of clubs, so he properly played low from dummy. When I continued with the deuce he ducked again, reasoning that I assure you the king in dummy and the ten in his own hand East would be forced to win with the ace.

But my partner won the trick with the jack and, being no dope, played another club which I took with the ace.

I now administered the coup de grace. I led the five of clubs. South discarded a diamond from dummy and my partner trumped with the jack. There was then no way for South to avoid losing trump trick and he would no longer have any. Cordially yours, John E. Doe.
