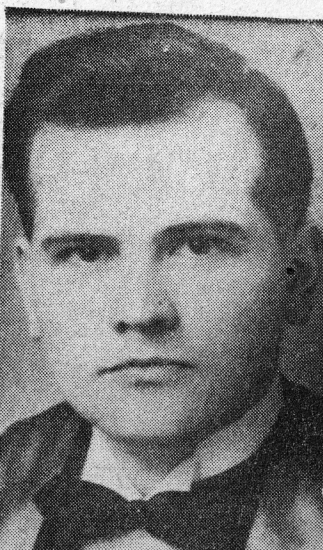

John Buchan's Words Penetrate To The Soul

We thought of John Buchan's words, as expressed by "Andrew" in "Salute to Adventurers" when we listened last Sunday to a boyhood friend of James, one born and reared in the district, who with his "gude wife" had come from a distance to stop a while with us at Alderlea, to chat with James of "the dear dead days."

"There is that in a man's birthplace which keeps tight fingers on his soul" Andrew says, in speaking of an innate yearning for his own.

How happily the two spoke of those young years and scenes and the names of those who once walked with them therein! For them their every care fell away. James forgot for the time the farming, and the fact that our cropping was not yet finished; that "by rights" in a sober Sabbath thought that intruded somehow "those mangels should all be in by this" and that "when we come down to the fine thing" the new meadows look "not too promising yet" this year. The visitor, an extremely busy and well loved Island-doctor as was his father before him, forgot, we could fancy, every ill and misery of his wide practice momentarily, and together they were young lads of the district again, in the district school down the River Road, carving initials on the already sadly scarred old desks—since vanished; bound to miss nothing of the drama about and any comedy particularly, the day afforded absorbing often only such seeds of knowledge as changed in spite of them to fall to good soil. Their laughter was as youthful as they relived in mind this and that remembered incident—finding much stored away; the amusing, the pleasant, and the not-so-good of those now faded school-years.

Or again "Savin'" their wives "prudence" they were off on young excursions of courtin in that "nice buggy of yours."

"A three-quarter it was — It would turn on a five-cent-piece" James nodded. Or away by horse and sleigh, bells jingling happily through an old frosty-white winter night, back in that detectable era of peace, interrupted, indeed it seems sometimes ended, by World War I which took the youthful doctor-to-be overseas to be a young lad no more.

"What amusing characters there were in those old days..."

Do you remember Angus who said it was adorable to be loved by two women but who married neither of them?"

So they remembered—and went back to those formative years to speak of those they liked or admired or suffered, who had unwittingly shaped in no small degree their beliefs in mankind during life. And for a time the two that, each in his own calling had seen and learned much since of life and living—its toils and responsibilities and demands were again lads-of-fellows, young and blithe and gay, their whole world in intriguing prospect ahead.

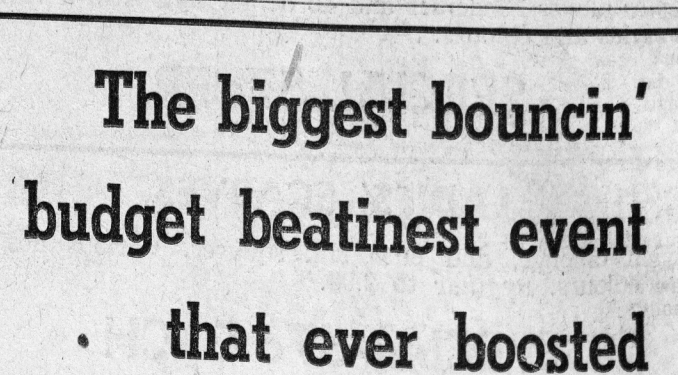
