SIR.—The Hon. D. Gordon evades the real point at issue. It is not whether the late Rev. C. H. Spurgeon used tobacco, why and to what extent, but whether he used intoxicating liquors as a beverage. Some men may be open to the charge of hypocrisy and inconsistency, but Mr. Spurgeon was not one of the number. As a matter of fact, two years ago every student in Pastor's College, except one, took a pledge of total abstinence at the hands of their President, Rev. C. H. Spurgeon. His address on that occasion, in which he set forth the reason why he himself was a total abstainer, was the ground of my protest. I am not in the habit of making statements at random, and I am too busy to continue a discussion in which the word of one man stands over against that of another. I cannot at present lay my hand on a copy of the address above referred to, but in a few days I hope to be able to lay before the public such proofs of the justness of my protest as will convince Hon. Mr. Gordon or any other candid man that the late Rev. C. H. Spurgeon has not for many years been in the habit of using intoxicating liquors as a beverage.
