Gladsy was estimated at 70 m.p.h. over San Juan, Puerto Rico Monday night, moving toward the southwest at 17 m.p.h. an hour but was expected to slow down and turn northwest Tuesday. Gladsy, fourth hurricane of the season, was about 1,700 miles southeast of Miami, m.p.h. over a small area near the coast and gave force winds reaching out 175 miles to the west and 75 miles to the south. CITY COUNCIL HOLDS SESSION

Meeting With Provincial Officials To Discuss Housing Project

City Council will seek a meeting with provincial government officials at the earliest possible date to discuss the city's proposed low income housing project. At the regular monthly meeting yesterday, council set up a committee consisting of Council members and several interested citizens should be formed to study the housing project thoroughly. "Until we get a committee, we are just going to talk about this every month and get nowhere," he said. If the force is renewed, that council was unable to talk until the provincial government gave its sanction. Council had received no reply from the government to a request made early this year for permission to go ahead on the project.

Miminegash Will Get Moss Processing Plant

OTTAWA — The new Irish moss processing plant in Prince Edward Island will be located at Miminegash, a fishing community in West Prince, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught said here Monday. Mr. MacNaught said that the Miminegash area was in the heart of the Irish moss land on the island and it was serviced with electricity and had a paved road. Last week, officials of the department of fisheries from Ottawa were in the area to choose an exact site and their recommendation will be submitted to the department for approval. If approved, the government is expected to close the deal with the present owner of the property some time next week. The Solicitor General explained that while the exact lot deal is not divided until the deal is closed, it will be an area of land facing Northumberland Strait and not too far from salt water. The processing of the moss requires a large volume of salt water. Once the land is acquired it is planned to get tenders on the construction of the frame plant and work is expected to get underway this fall. Financing is being provided by the Atlantic Development Board, which has allocated \$100,000 for the project.

New Ferry Tenders Due On Nov. 25

OTTAWA — Tenders on the new ferry to serve Prince Edward Island are due Nov. 25 this year, Transport Minister J. W. Pickersgill said in the Commons Monday in a reply to a question from Hon. Angus MacLean. He said the design of the ferry has been completed and that the firm of G.T.R. Campbell and Company of Montreal, naval architects, had been engaged in the design work. Tenders have been called and are due Nov. 25 and the largest date for completion of the ferry is December 1967. Earlier, outside the house, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught denied that there was any doubt or hesitation in the government's thinking about proceeding with the ferry. He said that a number of Canadian shipbuilding yards have been invited to tender on the large vessel and that it normally takes two or three months for such tenders to be prepared. He said the ferry was on schedule and that it normally required about 30 months construction time. British Get New Daily

LONDON (CP) The Sun, the first new daily newspaper to be launched in Britain in 54 years, hit the streets here today. The Sun is conceived as a broad radical newspaper "born of the age we live in." It replaces the old-fashioned press Daily Herald. Its dawn launch has been preceded by a spectacular advertising campaign that has cost more than \$250,000 (\$110,000).

Turks Shelve Plans To Break Blackade

ANKARA (AP)—Turkey has shelved indefinitely its plan to ship supplies to the blockaded Turkish-Cypriot enclave of Kokkina, Cyprus, under armed escort. Premier Ismet Inönü's cabinet announced in a communique Monday the conveyer, scheduled for today, was postponed at the request of United Nations Secretary-General U. Thant. That averted a third of open hostilities between the two sides. President Archbishop Makarios' Greek-Cypriot armed forces at Kokkina, where villagers and a few soldiers have been holed up, have been sealed off for six weeks. In announcing the plan Thant said the UN would be under guard of a destroyer and warplanes. Inönü said "any further escalation of the blockade... will be considered an attack and answered in the same way." The Makarios regime responded that the conveyer would be prepared to meet an aggressive act and resisted.

Three Crew Members Die In Fire Aboard Freighter

The Coast Guard cutter Cherokee radioed Monday, despite a fire aboard, that it was heading for drydock at Norfolk, Va. The master reported the fire aboard the freighter, with 40 men aboard, was not damaged or in need of assistance. Twenty crew members of the freighter helped within minutes Sunday. Thirty-three members of the crew were taken to New London, Conn., by the Coast Guard cutter Overseas. Four crew members and five coast guardmen remaining aboard the distressed ship were reported in no immediate danger.
