Supreme Court Has Two Cases

SUMMERSIDE — The fall session of Supreme Court opens here this morning with two cases on the docket.

Carl Joseph Franklin Arsenault, Summerside, is charged with breaking, entering and committing an indictable offence.

The charge arose from an incident on May 1st of this year in which a dwelling on Notre Dame Street here was broken into.

The second case sees Joseph Wilbert Hippenstall of Summerside appearing on a charge of break and enter with intent to commit an indictable offence and theft of an auto.

This charge was laid as a result of a break into the Ralph Calbeck and Co. general store in Bedouque on May 22, 1965.

Board Secretary Tells Of Compensation Plan

Seventy-five per cent of wages up to annual salaries of \$5,000 are paid to injured workers by the Provincial Workmen's Compensation Board" according to M.E. Campbell the board's secretary and safety supervisor.

He said "in addition to wages all hospital and medical bills were looked after by the board; if the worker is unable to continue in his former occupation following injury the board usually employs a system of redirection or retraining.

Hearing Set In Rape Case

Four Georgetown youths charged with rape appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County court yesterday had a preliminary hearing date set for December 14. The four accused are: Joseph Carl Solomon, Lawrence Stewart Burke, Kenneth Gerald Joseph Arsenault and Wilfred William Prosper Jr. John Nicholson is counsel for the accused.

Norman B. Smith, New Glasgow, charged with driving a motor vehicle in a manner dangerous to the public was assessed \$100 and costs or 30 days and had his license suspended for a period of six months.

Aidon L. Horton, Peters Road, charged with break, entry and theft was given a two-year suspended sentence. A \$500 bond was posted for the accused.

Fines of \$20 and costs or 15 days were imposed on two men charged with being intoxicated in a public place.

Assistance Follow-up Said Lacking

Nothing further is being done to seek government assistance for Prince Edward Island lobster fishermen in the fall season area—it runs from Victoria to North Point along the southern coast—who have had disastrously poor catches and cash returns this year.

The Prince Edward Island government was interested in applying for some measure of compensation from the Canada government, and was prepared to go along with the matching 80 percent that is required from the provinces.

However the matter was dropped, apparently, when something less than enthusiastic response came from the sister Maritime Provinces when the problem of making an united appeal for assistance was proposed.

This is in spite of reliable reports that fishermen in some of the areas on the New Brunswick eastern coast line said they had their worst season in many years.
