Death Of Mgr. W. E. Young

YARMOUTH, N. S., July 7.—Rev. Monsignor W. E. Young, one of the best-known Roman Catholic leaders in Nova Scotia died today.

One of the original directors of Yarmouth hospital, he joined with a group of far-sighted citizens to bring the institution through the difficult years following its establishment. "Father Young" spoke at many recruiting meetings during the Great War.

A year ago, Monsignor Young was forced to give up his strenuous work because of ill-health. Death came following a heart attack.

NEW TRADE STRUCTURE FOR ITALY SEEN

ROME, July 7.—A completely new international trade structure for Italy was envisioned tonight by high Fascists.

Officials said the reconstruction of the national foreign trade system would be accomplished "without haste or preferences."

At the same time, they indicated the Italian government was in no hurry to accept an invitation to join other Locarno treaty signatories in a conference concerning Germany's renunciation of the Rhineland and the possibilities for a new European peace structure.

Italy's position on these two last points was described by Virginia Cayda, authoritative editorial writer, as more secure than before the Italo-Ethiopian war with its consequent imposition of sanctions.

During the Ethiopian war, Italians were told Premier Mussolini intended to build up compensating trade with non-sanctionist states, friends of Italy tried in the "sanctionist crucible."

Mr. Heath Strong referred to the death during the past year of the Hon. W. M. Lea and moved that a letter of condolence be forwarded to Mr. Lea's bereaved family. This was agreed to unanimously.

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Further Huge Sum To Be Spent On Defence

LONDON, July 7.—Great Britain prepared tonight to spend another huge sum, estimated at between \$15,000,000 and \$25,000,000 (\$75,000,000-\$125,000,000), on defence.

Developments in the European situation, it was learned, had convinced ministers that the urgency of national defence must take precedence over all else, including all considerations of balancing the budget.

With the country already facing an overdraft as a result of the rearmament program, the army, navy and air force will issue additional supplementary estimates Thursday.

The navy, which has had ample opportunity to review its theoretical strength of weakness during the Mediterranean crisis, may ask as much as £10,000,000 extra, members of Parliament believed.

The air force, already carrying out plans to triple its strength, is expected to ask almost as much.

The army, attempting to reach a high standard of mechanical and technical strength, may request between £6,000,000 and £7,000,000.

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FRANCE BANS STAY-IN STRIKE

PARIS, July 7.—France served official notice tonight she will keep strikers from occupying places of business—even as angry motor plant workers were reported to have seized and imprisoned two company directors.

Roger Salengro, Minister of the Interior, told the Senate, just before the government received a 225-to-9 vote of confidence: "The government will put into action all appropriate means to put an end to the occupations."

The newspaper Le Journal, incidentally, said strikers at the Citroen automobile factory, near Chaumont, had locked up two company directors after the directors refused demands for the dismissal of two engineers.

Warnings heard of new offensive by extreme left-rightist leaders to be prosecuted.

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THREE ARE ACQUITTED IN SUPREME COURT

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British Press Comments On Airship Flights

LONDON, July 7.—Flights of the German airship Hindenburg over strategic areas of Britain and Canada were again the topic of anxious comment in the British press today.

On each of its four voyages, so far the Daily Express said that the Hindenburg has chosen different routes to cross Great Britain.

It has crossed the industrial area of the Midlands, and the naval shipyards along the coast of the channel.

When it was in Canada on its last trip, the paper went on, the ship hovered for quite some time over Prince Edward Island and the ports of Saint John and Halifax.

These two ports, it was pointed out, are the only ice free harbors on the Canadian coast and both have dry dock facilities capable of accommodating warships.

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Changes Announced In St. F. X. Staff

ANTIGONISH, N. S., July 7.—Changes in the staff of St. Francis Xavier University here were announced today.

Rev. P. J. Nicholson, Ph.D., professor of physics, has been appointed director of studies succeeding Rev. R. K. MacInyre, recently appointed parish priest of Little Bras d'Or.

Rev. Leo G. McCreary, M.A., professor of mathematics and vice-rector, has been granted a year's leave of absence.

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N. B. Crops Are Flourishing

SALISBURY, N. B., July 7.—While crops in many parts of Canada and the United States are suffering from drought, those in New Brunswick are flourishing as a result of favorable weather conditions.

Hon. A. G. Taylor, provincial minister of agriculture, said today.

"I am very much encouraged by the prospects which face New Brunswick farmers," he said. "It is not often that a good general crop is coincidental with a steady and rising price trend."

The weather has been ideal for hay. Grain crops have been growing well, and although the comparatively cold weather of the last few days has retarded some of our garden vegetables, they have been delayed rather than injured, so the outcome is affected but little.

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Report Officers Killed In Ambush

ROME, July 7.—An unidentified Italian air general and nine aviators including the famous pilot Antonio Locatelli, were killed in an Ethiopian scrap several days ago, reliable sources said tonight despite official denial.

The aviators apparently were fulfilling an assignment when an ambush could not be confirmed.

It was understood Premier Mussolini's orders were being awaited for the issuance of an authentic statement.

Reports of the deaths published so far were denied by the Ministry of Press and Propaganda.

LONDON, July 7.—Reports that Italian officials denied tonight stated eight or nine Italian officers, among them the noted pilot Antonio Locatelli, had been killed in an Ethiopian ambush.

(In Rome it was stated officially the reports were not true.)

The reports, which the Reuters Agency said came from unofficial sources, asserted the officers were killed as soon as they landed in three planes to establish a garrison at the request of Jimma Province residents.

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Initiations Illegal At Toronto Univ.

TORONTO, July 7.—All freshmen initiations at the University of Toronto will be illegal from now on, the calendar issued by the registrar's office stated today, unless the initiation has been given faculty approval.

Interference with the personal liberty of any student or summoning him to appear before any tribunal of students will be punished with suspension or expulsion.

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Spurns Offers Of Further Aid

SALISBURY, N. B., July 7.—Triple killer Delbert Green, sentenced to be shot Friday, spurned offers of aid today—and prepared to "take it like a man."

"It's no use wasting any more money on me," was the 25-year-old slayer's reply to an offer by fellow convicts to finance a last appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

Green will be lashed to a chair, blindfolded, his back to a prison wall. Five riflemen, paid \$25 each, will carry out the sentence, imposed for the murder of Green's wife, her mother and an uncle.
