

Burlington Church Will Mark 100th Anniversary

Commemorating its 100th anniversary, special services beginning this Sunday, will be held at St. Stephen's Anglican Church at Burlington, each evening throughout the week.

It was in 1855, during the rectorship of Rev. William Meek, that this church was constructed, and in those days about 200 people attended services held here.

The week of services will be commenced this Sunday evening by the present rector, Rev. W. E. Ingraham.

On Monday, Archdeacon G. R. Harrison, of Summerside, will conduct a missionary service, and St. Mary's Anglican Church choir of Summerside, will also be in attendance.

Tuesday evening a layman's night will be conducted by Canon J. T. Ibbot, of Charlottetown, and Rev. A. E. Piercy of Milton, and the choir will be present.

Wednesday evening service will include an A.Y.P.A. rally for the desecration, with Alberton and Port Hill choirs in charge of the music.

The officiating clergymen will be Rev. J. R. MacMahon, and Rev. M. J. Findlay.

Thursday evening will be highlighted by a women's rally, with the Crapaud choir, and Rev. G. R. Ebsary present.

Friday evening will be family night, with St. Peter's choir from Charlottetown, and Canon G. R. Moffatt and Rev. W. G. Fogg present.

The week's observance will be concluded on Sunday morning with holy communion, and the service will be conducted by the regular pastor, Rev. W. E. Ingraham.

Canada Adopts Belgian Automatic Rifle For Army; Will Mean Change In Drill

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada has been decided to adopt this modern type of small arms weapon as the standard rifle for the Canadian army.

The defence department this year planned to spend about \$100,000,000 on army equipment, including tooling for production in Canada of the weapon. Standardized drawings already had been prepared.

Adoption of the rifle means a major change will have to be made in traditional army drill. Because the cocking handle of the FN is on the left—instead of the right, as with the 303—the stop arms movement will be eliminated.

The slope arms movement—rifle cantoned over the left shoulder and held by the butt—is part of army tradition. However, it has to be done away with because if a soldier attempted to use the FN to slope arms the rifle's cocking handle would strike his left shoulder.

Soldiers probably will carry the new rifle by holding it straight pistol-grip and the top of the barrel tucked into the shoulder.

The FN is gas-operated and cooled and is three inches shorter than the Lee-Enfield. It weighs 10.6 pounds fully loaded compared with 8.3 pounds for the 303, and its ammunition is lighter.

The rifle can be fired either automatic or semi-automatic. The magazine holds 20 rounds compared with 10 for the Lee-Enfield. It can fire at a rate of 700 rounds a minute with only one squeeze of the trigger.

Propose Drastic Changes In Commons Rules

OTTAWA (CP)—Drastic changes in the rules of the Commons aimed at streamlining its work were proposed Tuesday to the House in the unanimous report of an all-party committee.

Speeches would be cut down and length of debates limited. The number of weekly working hours would remain the same, but the times of Friday sittings would be changed to bring in the morning sitting and eliminate a night sitting on that day.

The House received her report with enthusiastic desk-thumping from all parties, including eventual passage. The report was referred to the committee of the whole for consideration.

Main provisions include a 30-minute restriction on speeches made while the House is in committee of the whole, cutting 10 minutes off the present time, and a similar limitation on speeches made while the Speaker is in the chair. Exceptions include the prime minister and the opposition leader, and cabinet ministers and private members under certain circumstances.

The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne, which now has no time limit, would be held down to 10 days.

The budget debate—also unlimited now—would be held to eight days.

Morning sittings would be held during the throne speech debate to expedite its finish. This debate often has dragged on for weeks.
