FROM EUROPE.

New York, Dec. 29.—Steamship Australia, with Liverpool dates to the 17th, arrived this p. m. News unimportant.

London, Sunday, Dec. 17.—It is stated that the health of the Queen of Spain is improving.

The King of the Belgians was buried yesterday. The new King has taken the oath of office.

The message of President Johnson has been favorably received, and is regarded as friendly, and United States bonds improved after its reception.

It is stated that Spain has accepted the mediation of England in Chilean affairs.

The trial of Capt. McCafferty, the American Fenian, is progressing rapidly.

January 4, 1866.—News from South Pacific states that on the 18th November, Chilean Man-of-War "Emeralda" captured Spanish Gunboat "Cavandongo," having on board Spanish Admiral's correspondence.

Engagement lasted half an hour—14 Spaniards were wounded and 2 killed. "Emeralda" was damaged.

Prisoners taken were a commander, 6 officers, and 110 men, who were kindly treated by authorities and people.

The Commander of the "Emeralda" has been promoted to post of Captain, and a subscription commenced to present him with a sword of honor.

Though Spanish Admiral was only forty miles off he was ignorant of the capture until informed by Chilean papers, three days afterwards.

Spanish Flagship "Vill de Madrid" left Valparaiso on evening of December 1st supposed for Calcutta.

MELANCHOLY CATASTROPHE.—On Thursday, the 21st ult., D. J. Roberts, Esq., of this City, together with Capt. Campbell, Capt. Henderson, Messrs. Farady, Lewis, and another person whose name we have not been able to ascertain, were on board the "Carroll" in a small open boat, for the purpose of crossing over to St. John's.

The boat was, we understand, setting strongly to the north at the time, and a snow-storm coming on soon after their departure from Carroll, there is too much reason to fear that the boat was swamped, and that all on board have perished with her!

For some days entertained that the party had succeeded in reaching Picton Island; but this last faint hope was dissipated on Tuesday last, when a telegram was received intimating that up to that time the missing boat had not touched the Island. This is one of the most heart-rending calamities that has ever occurred in the Straits of Northumberland under our recollection.
