Despite Quiet, Battle Still On For Fraser River Project

VANCOUVER (CP)—Power interests don't seem to be generating much wattage lately in their bid to have the Fraser River churn out electricity for them. About three years ago there was a lot of talk about an American company planning a 700-foot dam that would cost \$500,000,000. And before that there had been published reports about a plan for a series of 10 power dams on the Fraser - Thompson rivers. But fisheries officials of the federal and B.C. governments apparently have been able to noid the line against the encroachment of power interests. That \$40,000,000 haul of sockeye salmon this season hasn't hurt the cause of the people who don't care for a dam site on the Fraser. FIGHT STILL ON However, Senator Thomas Reid, chairman of the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission, said the fight is by no means won. Salmon experts have always contended it might be possible to build one or two small power dams without impairing the salmon spawning cycle, but big dams would eliminate the fisheries. A recent report by research scientists at the University of British Columbia supports this earlier thinking. They say it is possible for salmon to safely go up and down the Fraser if a 100-foot dam is built in the lower Fraser canyon but a proposed 700-foot dam near Lillooet would place extreme pressure on salmon runs. Their report is part of a \$50,000 study of getting the Fraser's huge and rich salmon runs up and down the river, financed by the B.C. Electric Company Limited. It was prepared by Prof. Edward S. Precious and Lorne R. Kersey of UBC and G. B. Contractor of the B.C. research council. GLOOMY PROSPECTS The prospects for a 700-foot dam were gloomy. Fishways to get spawning fish around the dam could easily cost \$50,000,000 or more and would be an expensive gamble because no one knows if they would work. Fish locks, the report said, hold the best promise as they cause little exertion on the fish. But it is no use thinking about fish passages for salmon bound upstream if the problem of young fingerlings getting down over the dam is not solved, the scientists said. One solution to this problem is to build a bypass, using a series of pools, arranged to take the

ian theory of hiding the strongest suit secondarily, overcalled Roth's two heart bid with two spades. Stone, with the best hand at the table, drove the hand to five hearts, which Forquet doubled. The bold double by Forquet was followed by the daring underlead of the ace of diamonds, the only lead which could defeat the contract. Siniscalco won the diamond and returned a club which Forquet ruffed. Eventually, another club trick was lost by Roth and he went down one. At the other table the bidding went:

After opening the ace of diamonds Sidoror shifted to a spade. D'Alelio won in dummy and cashed two trumps and a spade. He next ruffed a spade, then a diamond, and then another spade. When he now led a club to dummy's eight, Crawford was employed. A club return would be into dummy's A-J, while a diamond return would permit the jack of clubs to be discarded as declarer ruffed. So the Italians made five hearts at one table while their teammates defeated five hearts doubled at the other table for a net gain of 550 points on the deal.

New Steamship Service Planned

MONTREAL (CP)—The Brown-Cuba line announced Thursday that a new steamship service from Montreal and Halifax to Bermuda and the Caribbean is to be opened next month. The service is to be inaugurated by the Rio Damuji, sailing from Montreal Oct. 17. The next sailing from Montreal is to be made by a new vessel, the Pinar Del Rio, Oct. 31. A spokesman said both vessels are owned by the National Bank of Cuba. The service is being operated on the bank's behalf. He said the ships bought from Canadian National Steamships by the Cuban bank are to be used in the new service as soon as negotiations now in progress are completed. CNS sold the eight-ship fleet after it had been strikebound for several months by the Seafarers' International Union (C.I.O.). The 4,200-ton Pinar Del Rio, recently completed in England, is the first of six new ships being built for the National Bank of Cuba for operation by Brown-Cuba lines.

Ask Doctor Examine Mine Survivors

TRURO (CP)—A resolution calling for a "specially skilled doctor" to examine miners trapped for more than 80 hours in a 1956 Springhill explosion was endorsed Thursday by the district 26 convention of the United Mine Workers of America (U.M.W.). It asked the UMW to obtain a doctor with experience in treating men trapped in a mine for a long period. Vice-president Steve Dohtany said there should be legislation to protect these men. "Many of whom are now physical or mental wrecks," the explosion in No. 4 Colliery, since closed, took the lives of 39 miners. Another 88 were rescued. The convention winds up its first week today.

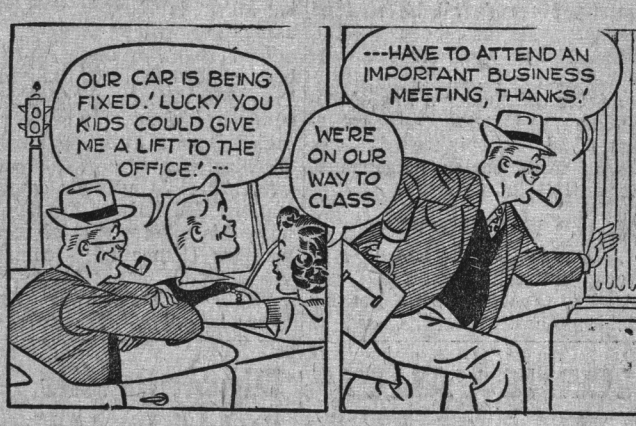

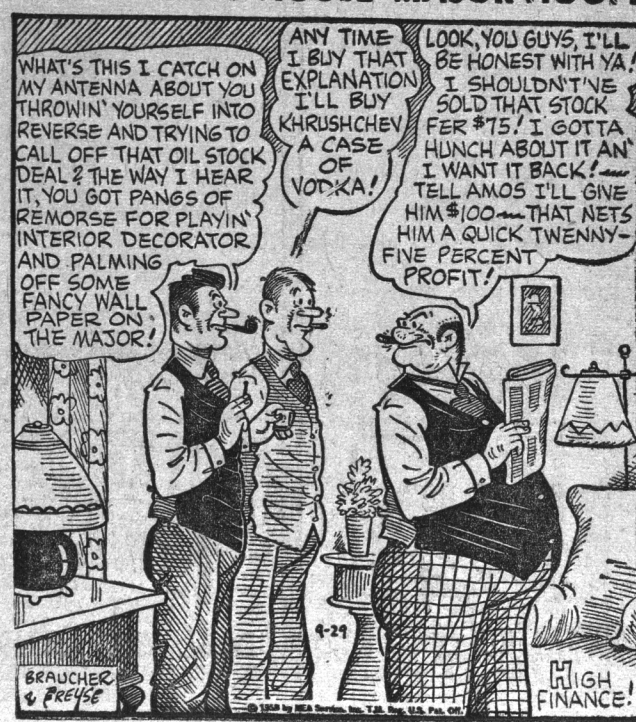

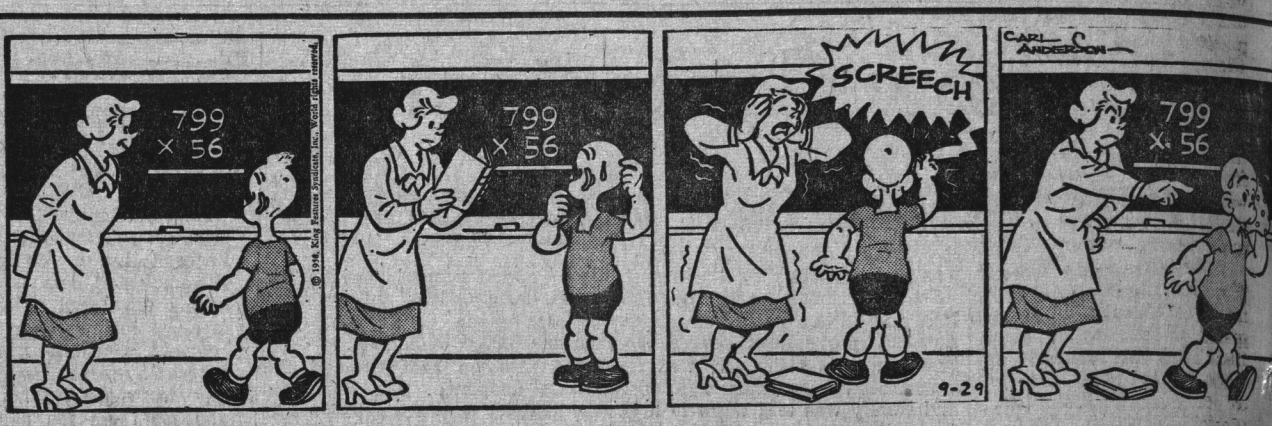
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
