

Vatican Council's First Phase Called One Of Crystalization

VATICAN CITY (AP)—"This has been a period of crystalization," said an American bishop as the Roman Catholic ecumenical council ended its first phase.

Chalchicomula in the 20th century. Many bishops have put themselves into the two mainstreams by their personal approaches to the job.

PREFER OLD WAYS
Persons close to the council here describe as conservatives those prelates who want little change, who prefer the old ways and what they consider the safe paths, who tend to resist departures from the norms of centuries.

The progressives are seen as those who favor new and broad approaches to old problems, the widest degree of reform consistent with both unchanging doctrine and the modern mood of doing everything possible to bring all Christians closer to—bringing up to date of the reunion.

Pope John set the council's tone when he called the worldwide assembly of Roman Catholic bishops and gave as their prime task an "aggiornamento"—bringing up to date of the reunion.

Observes here the identical Vatican curia, the several hundred prelates based in Rome to handle the day by day administration of the church, with the conservative element. Their staunch allies are said to be many of the older bishops and cardinals from a number of nations.

Hundreds of bishops presumably belong to neither side, but support one group or the other, depending on their views on a particular matter.

A Jesuit biblical scholar familiar with the issues before the council has commented: "These differences of approach exist not only in every church but also in every field of human affairs. This is the old story of administrators versus intellectuals. There are always those who want to church ahead and those who don't want the boat rocked."

FORCE NEW IMAGE
The leaders of the progressive group have shown themselves in the hierarchy of northern Europe. The "Transalpinis" or those "across the Alps" forced a new image of Catholicism in Germany, Austria, Holland, France and Belgium while those nations were resurrecting themselves materially from the ashes of world war. They have carried that spirit with them into the council.

But from attitudes reflected in the official daily communiques and from the lists of daily speakers, the progressive and the conservative arguments have shown through in much of the debating of the first session.

During examination of a thesis on liturgy, or public worship, progressives favored the greatest use of modern languages in the Latin mass and the widest application of regional customs to the fixed forms of the liturgy in mission lands.

Helpful Recipes For Holiday Meal

Islanders, like people everywhere, have varied tastes when it comes to stuffing for the chicken bird. Some like plain stuffing, while others like it accented with a distinct flavor. Featured here are a variety of recipes for stuffing 1 1/2 to 2 birds.

POLY TURKEY ROASTING CHART
(oven temperature 325 degrees)
Turkey (ready-to-cook)
6 to 8 lbs.—3 1/2 to 4 1/2 hours.
8 to 12 lbs.—4 to 5 hours.
12 to 16 lbs.—5 to 6 1/2 hours.
16 to 20 lbs.—6 to 7 1/2 hours.
20 to 24 lbs.—7 1/2 to 9 hours.
Chicken
4 to 5 lbs.—2 1/2 to 3 hours.
Over 5 lbs.—3 to 4 hours.
Duckling
4 to 6 lbs.—1 1/2 hours to 2 hours.

One-half cup butter or margarine (melted)
12 cups dry old bread crumbs or 3 packages (8 oz. each) bread stuffing
One-half cup minced celery
Two tablespoons minced parsley
Three teaspoons salt (approx)
Two teaspoons sage (or more if you prefer)
One half teaspoon pepper
One and one-half cups stock
Cook onion in the butter in a saucepan over low heat until yellow. Pour this over the combined bread crumbs, celery, parsley, and seasonings in a large bowl. Toss lightly. Sprinkle with enough stock to moisten slightly; stuff the turkey (15 lbs dressed) it should be only 5/8 full.

TURKEYS IN ALUMINUM FOIL
(oven temperature 450 degrees)
6 to 9 lbs.—2 1/2 to 3 1/2 hours.
10 to 13 lbs.—2 3/4 to 3 hours.
14 to 17 lbs.—3 to 3 1/4 hours.
18 to 21 lbs.—3 1/4 to 3 3/4 hours.
22 to 25 lbs.—3 3/4 to 4 hours.
Browning—20 minutes before end of roasting time, open and fold back aluminum foil. Spoon juices in bottom of foil over turkey and let brown.

POTATO STUFFING
Eight cups unseasoned mashed potatoes
One egg (unbeaten)
Four cups dry bread crumbs
One-half cup butter or fat
One-fourth cup minced parsley
One-half cup chopped onion
Two teaspoons salt
One-fourth teaspoon pepper
Two teaspoons poultry seasoning
Two cups hot water
Combine potatoes and egg. Add the bread crumbs and butter. Stir in the remaining ingredients. Mix well. This is enough for 12 pound turkey.

SAVORY STUFFING
One-half cup minced onion
One cup diced celery
One-half cup minced onion
One tablespoon minced parsley
Two cups diced apple (peeled)
Combine all ingredients and blend thoroughly (enough for 12 lb. turkey).

APPLE STUFFING
Eight cups cubed bread crumbs removed
One-half cup butter
One teaspoon thyme
One-half teaspoon sage
Two teaspoons salt
One teaspoon pepper
One cup diced celery
One-half cup minced onion
One tablespoon minced parsley
Two cups diced apple (peeled)
Combine all ingredients and blend thoroughly (enough for 12 lb. turkey).

Yuletide Spirit Prevails In S'ide As Festive Season Approaches

Some 30 years ago Santa Claus started coming early to Summerside, and every succeeding year has brought delight to thousands of children, and signalled the real start of the Christmas season.

Santa has had many fascinating methods of arrival in town. Parents of holiday children fondly recall his arrival by reindeer, and of his descent through a large "chimney" to the RCAF Station.

Others will recall his arrival at Summerside by train, and the excitement of meeting him at the CNR station. Children of today will remember other arrivals of Santa; once on an RCMP ship, and other times by air, being met as he stepped off the plane at the RCAF Station.

Each arrival of Santa Claus sparks an air of excitement and produces a magical expression of delight on the faces of the children who are on hand to welcome him each year.

The past few years have featured a Santa Claus Parade, and in the past two, led by the RCAF band, costumed characters depicting some of the better known fairy tale personalities, have preceded Santa along the parade route and provided even more excitement and interest to the event.

Two other features of the holiday season are fast rivaling Santa's arrival as accepted seasonal activities. These are the addition of the now well-known "Santa Claus Lane," and the "Christmas Window Contest," sponsored by The Evening Patriot.

"Santa Claus Lane," successful through the participation and co-operation of the Summerside Town Council, retail merchants of the Board of Trade, and business firms and offices, transforms the main business area into a gaily lighted, tree-decorated driveway, which this year has added several blocks to the former sections decorated in this manner.

SPARKED INTEREST
The Patriot "Christmas Window Contest," has sparked an increasing interest in the appearance of store windows, and

merchants are giving more attention each year to this part of their business establishments. Citizens are similarly paying more attention to the merchandise displayed in windows and are more appreciative of the variety of merchandise that can be purchased right in Summerside.

Santa Claus Lane begins with the town of Summerside securing a large number of small Christmas trees which are attached in pairs to poles, each to parking meters. The trees followed this by running specially installed power lines along the street a short distance above the Christmas trees.

Then the merchants and offices are requested to provide Christmas tree lights and install them on the trees directly in front of their places of business.

TREES SHINING
When this is done members of the Summerside electric light department provide a free electrical hook-up and free power to the electric lights in the trees.

This year, Dave Miller, chairman of the retail merchants committee responsible for getting these trees decorated, has done a marvellous job, and there is not a tree that doesn't "shine brightly" at night, giving a most beautiful effect as motorists or pedestrians travel along the streets and sidewalks.

Complimenting and even overpowering this however, are the store windows which are identified with the theme, the splendour, the attractiveness, of Christmas.

This is the time of year when store windows present the most collective displays of merchandise, in settings that have the strongest appeal for shoppers, for it is at this time that more shopping is done than in any comparative period of the whole year.
