Drummed Out of the Regiment.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 30.

A ceremony took place in the barrack grounds to-day, the like of which the oldest citizen only remembers of having occurred once before and that was when H. M. 22nd Regiment was stationed here. It was the drumming out of the Royal School of Infantry of Private Nason. The full corps was called out and in their presence Lieut. Col. Maunsel publicly expelled Nason, and in doing so briefly addressed them, regretting to take such a step and urging them to be soldiers in every sense of the word. Nason had been guilty of deserting two or three times and other unbecoming conduct.

What the Amendments Did.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.

N. C. Wallace, M. P., promoter of the Act for the suppression of trade combinations, admits that amendments made to his bill last session in the Senate, rendered it quite useless, and he says that he will endeavor to have the measure amended next session. Mr. Wallace thinks that if the bill had been passed in the form in which he introduced it, trusts and combines could have been easily suppressed.

Another Disaster.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.

The St. Joseph Cannon-ball train of the Rock Island Road ran into the rear of the Denver express at Seneca last evening, wrecking the dining car on the Denver express, and engine, tender, and baggage car of the St. Joseph train. Major T. C. Gibson, of this city, an unknown lady, and the engineer of the St. Joseph train were quite severely injured.

A Missionary Massacre.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

Advices from Brisbane state that the natives of south-west New Guinea have massacred Rev. Mr. Savage, sent out by the London Missionary Society, also a number of native teachers, and the crew of the cutter Mary, belonging to the Society. The steamer Albatross, of the Queensland Government has been despatched to the scene of the murder.

Sued for the Amount.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.

Senator Clewof, of Ottawa, is being sued for the amount of a note for \$10,000, which he endorsed for Jasse, ex-M. P., at the time the latter bought La Minerere. Vasse it is said, repudiates responsibility for the note, and contends that Clewof has to pay for it.

Stanley Expected.

BERLIN, Oct. 30.

Dr. Schwanworth says that Emin Pascha and Stanley will, doubtless, soon arrive at Mpwapwa.

Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A BUDGET OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

REGINA, N. W. M., Oct. 29.—Mr. Cayley's motion to abolish the dual language system in the North-west was carried to-day before a full house, only two members, Mitchell of Batouche, and Hoey of Kinnistino, voting against it. Judge Roleau made an eloquent speech against the motion, but had no vote.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Chamberlain, speaking at a private caucus at Birmingham referred to his desire to retire from political life. He said, considering the abuse heaped upon him, he had more than once reflected whether "the game was worth the candle." Only love of country induced him to continue in public life.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—A prominent politician just returned from the Rockies gives an interesting account of the success of the Cochrane ranch company. They started business with 6,000 head of cattle, of which they lost all but 500 the first year. The next year their losses had reached a quarter of a million dollars, but the past three years have been so successful that they have not only regained the amount lost, but paid the stockholders an amount equal to ten per cent. per annum on capital, and placed \$100,000 to reserve profit account.

DUBLIN, Oct. 29.—Father McFadden to-day pleaded guilty of obstructing the police at the time of the murder of Inspector Martin, at Gweedore, in February, and he was liberated on his own recognizance, the government assenting to this disposition of the case.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Sir J. B. Lawes states the forecast of the British wheat crop must be considerably discounted. He puts the crop at a little over 8,000,000 quarters, and the amount required for consumption at 27,000,000. According to this the requirements will be higher than last year.
