wife's parents' home in a London suburb Sunday night as the family was sitting down to dinner. Police said Balcombe had dated Marie recently but she didn't know until they had been married.

They said Balcombe's seized car was imported to the investigation. There were also reports that officers had found a motel key in the Cornwall district which rented a motel to a couple last Wednesday.

Balcombe, a slim, dark-haired man with a crew haircut whose wife has an eight-week-old child, was dressed in a white T-shirt and army trousers when arrested. Police said he was known as "Pete" to the Carrier family.

His wife, Jean, 22, said that it was a "none of us knew anything about her" said her husband had a three-week furlough after being posted from Wainwright, Alta., to Valcartier. She, the baby and a 3 1/2-year-old child, had lived with Balcombe at Wainwright and moved to her parents' home until a house was found in Valcartier.

"He went up to Valcartier last week to arrange accommodation for us," Mrs. Balcombe said. "He got back here to London early Friday."

Body Identified

Provincial police moved quickly after three brothers of the slain girl came from Blenville, a village across the St. Lawrence river from Quebec City, and identified her in a Morrisburg funeral home. They arrested Balcombe in a matter of hours.

Police said they were not ready to suggest a motive for the killing. One of the Carrier brothers said it was jealousy.

Marie, a sergeant in the Reserve Army, was last seen Wednesday night when she left her home to attend parade drill.

Her commanding officer, Lt.-Col. J. Gordon Ross, started the investigation that led to identification. When he saw a newspaper description which said the murder victim had a chest depression left by an operation, he checked Marie's army medical records and found they showed the depression. Col. Ross called police. Army and police dental records of the girl also tallied.

Balcombe, a former taxi driver in London, joined the army last spring. He took a short-term five-year commission June 12. He attended a pre-medical course at the University of Western Ontario last year.

He was born in London, England, and was married five years ago. Balcombe's parents lived for a while in Montreal but his wife said they had recently returned to England.

Manhunt in N. B. Continues

NEW MILLS, N. B. (CP) — An intensive manhunt continued in this northern New Brunswick area Monday night as RCMP and local police pressed their search for the assailant of Theophile Gallant, 31, Campbellton taxi driver wounded by shotgun pellets Saturday night. His condition in hospital at Dalhousie was reported "much improved."

No motive is known for the shooting. Wounded in the hand, shoulder and thigh by the unknown assailant, he was driving from Campbellton to New Mills, Gallant stumbled to the Presbyterian manse at New Mills and was taken to hospital by Rev. E. H. Bean.

The RCMP used the dog Silver in trying to track the fugitive. It was unknown if he still carried the shotgun, which has not been found. One blast tore away part of Gal-

lance's leg.

British Commons Reassembles Today

LONDON, (CP) — The House of Commons reassembles today after an 81-day recess to tidy up loose ends from its 1952-53 sittings and prepare for the state opening of the new session Nov. 3.

The two big battalions, the ruling Conservatives and the opposition Labour party, numerically almost as strong, return for what is actually a kind of afterthought to the session which was recessed last July 31.

But, with foreign affairs to the forefront, the resumed sitting will be more than just the usual autumn epilogue.

The main bone of contention is likely to be the situation in the colony of British Guiana, ceded to Britain by Holland in 1814.

Describes Work As Rotary Director

Mr. Percy W. Turner, past president of Rotary International gave a graphic and instructive account of his experience as director in an address before the local club at the weekly meeting held at the Charlottetown hotel yesterday.

"I am grateful for having the opportunity to be in close touch with Rotary at top level," said Mr. Turner as he described the administrative set-up which deals with the 212 Districts. A Board of Directors consisting of fourteen members and a secretary of 125 at headquarters in Chicago treat with Rotary matters in 88 countries of the world. An office building is being built 30 miles outside Chicago which will be opened as the new Rotary headquarters in 1955, the year of Golden Jubilee for the organization. Rotary International will assemble there for the noteworthy occasion.

Mr. Turner also spoke of his work as a director at the meeting of Rotary International in Paris last summer. He stressed the falling courtesy of the French people and the high place in which Rotary is held by French officials.
