Full Time Director Of Music Appointed By St. Dunstan's

Two of the new professors who have joined the staff of St. Dunstan's University for 1965-66 are Robert Suen and Hubert Tersteeg.

Mr. Suen was born in China and received his BSc degree with honours in mathematics from Taiwan University after which he taught for two years at the university.

He then came to the United States to continue his studies at Wayne State University in Detroit, receiving his Master of Arts degree in mathematics from that institution last July.

Penitentiary Sentence Given Resident Of Bristol District

GEORGETOWN — Brenton Stanley Arnold of the Bristol area, who earlier pleaded guilty

to the possession of articles less than \$50, was yesterday sentenced to serve one year in Kings County Jail by Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown. Arnold has previously served three terms in Dorchester Penitentiary; two of those for theft and one for indecent assault of a female.

Deputy attorney general, J. Arthur McGuigan, represented the Crown in all cases.

Vernor Gerald Keefe, Morell Rear, was given a two-year suspended sentence for break, entry and theft and entered into a recognizance to keep the peace in the amount of \$1,000 with one surety. George Frederick Clark of Mt. Stewart pleaded not guilty to having the care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired. His case was adjourned by consent to Jan. 12.
