



Sire Testing For Beef Men To Be Viewed

Beef producers who are interested in the best methods of testing beef cattle sires will be attending the meeting at Birch Court this afternoon when the benefits of record of performance (ROP) testing for beef bulls will be explained.

In brief the policy makes possible the testing or proving of sires on a rate of gain per day of age basis.

Other things being equal, such as the amount of feed available and certain other conditions, a bull that gains three pounds or slightly more per day, is much more likely to produce calves that will make more rapid and more profitable gains, than one could expect from calves from an animal that had a much slower rate of gain.

These are some of the things Douglas Baird, chief of the production branch, Canada department of agriculture will talk about this afternoon at Birch Court. With him will be Don Nicholson, who is in charge of the ROP program for beef cattle.

The Hayden Brothers' herd of Hereford cattle at Cherry Valley is the only one on the Island now on ROP. Others may be interested in this valuable testing program after the Ottawa men explain the benefits, and the requirements this afternoon. The time of the meeting is two o'clock.

Inspection Lab Chief Named For Maritimes

Holder of a master's degree in biochemistry from Dalhousie University, Mr. Mack will be responsible for the business and scientific administration of the department's four regional inspection laboratories in the three oceanic provinces in addition to four mobile laboratories.

Mr. Mack comes to Halifax from the department of national health and welfare where he served latterly as superintendent of the food and drug directorate laboratory in Toronto. He joined the laboratory as chemist in 1949 and was eventually promoted to head this institution in Toronto.

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Centennial Year Aid Scheme To Involve National Appeal

OTTAWA — Canadians will be given the opportunity in 1967 of making a centennial contribution to the people of less fortunate nations.

The Canadian International Co-operation Year organization will meet in January to draw up plans for a national fund raising drive in our birthday year. Exact nature of the drive has not yet been determined, but it may take the form of a sale of centennial gift certificates.

Sam Cormier, chairman of the Canadian branch of ICY, said in an interview that there will be a massive appeal to Canadians to aid the cause of international development. To ensure that all the money will be used as a centennial gift, the Centennial Commission has given \$250,000 to ICY to enable it to carry on through 1967. International Co-operation Year ends Dec. 31, but next month the Canadian group will meet to plan the special effort.

"Canadians have been giving about \$15,000,000 annually through aid agencies but most of this has come from a small percentage of our citizens," Mr. Cormier explains. "Without disturbing this traditional giving, we should be able to at least double that amount. We hope, too, that the drive will have an effect on the future pattern of Canadian aid to underdeveloped nations."

GIVE GO-AHEAD
While some of the voluntary agencies are concerned about the effect of the centennial campaign on their normal receipts, all have urged ICY to go ahead with its proposal.

"It is our intention that no traditional source of funds will be tapped except to seek extra donations in centennial year," Mr. Cormier said.

There are people representing 32 organizations on the national council of ICY which meets every two months. There is an executive committee of seven and it is proposed to form a special allocations committee of experts to decide how the money will be distributed.

The Centennial Commission is solidly behind the project.

"We agree Canadians should do more than tool their own horns in 1967. We are a fortunate nation and our 100th birthday is a unique opportunity to share some of the good things of our life with others," a commission official said.

Federal Gov't Denies Interest In Freighter

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has no responsibility of any kind towards the Greek ocean freighter Protostatis which has been abandoned on a mudbank 16 miles east of Kingston, a transport department official said Tuesday.

G. W. Stead, assistant deputy minister heading the marine section, said the vessel remains the property and responsibility of the owners. Transport officers had reported from the scene that the 440-foot freighter is well clear of the main shipping channel leading from Lake Ontario into the St. Lawrence River and is not in any great danger of upsetting or shifting from the spot where it is aground.

He said there is a "rather involved" legal hassle over certain salvage charges and other costs levied against the vessel but the government is not a party to it. This dispute would have to be resolved to settle the question of who actually owns the freighter which has a load of scrap metal.

Island Farmers Borrowing More

OTTAWA — A total of 427 loans amounting to \$717,889 have been made to Prince Edward Island farmers under the Farm Improvement Loans Act in the second quarter of 1965, the Department of Finance announced here.

The total compares with 336 loans and \$469,306 in the corresponding quarter of 1964.

P.E.I. farmers have borrowed \$57,634 for the purchase of agricultural implements, \$32,478 for live stock, \$126,394 for construction purposes and \$1,393 for other purposes.

Loans under the Small Business Loans Act totalled \$64,265 in the second quarter of the year in P.E.I., the department reports. This compares with \$68,150 in the April to June period of last year.

The total includes \$19,675 borrowed by manufacturing industries, \$5,400 by the wholesale trade, \$10,140 by retailers and \$29,060 by service businesses.

CN Appoints Co-Ordinator

MONCTON (CP) — Canadian National Railways have announced the appointment of a co-ordinator to help find work for men who will lose their jobs as a result of a planned 1966 introduction of rail-car ferries on the CN run between North Sydney, N.S., and Port Aux Basques, Nfld.

Ron Kay, a native of Kent County, N.B., was named manpower co-ordinator for the ports of North Sydney and Argenta and Port Aux Basques in Newfoundland.

More than 600 employees at the three ports are expected to lose their jobs when the rail-cars are used. The ports now employ about 1,400 waterfront workers.

CN also announced it has signed an agreement with Labor Minister MacEachern and the International Longshoremen's Association to form a joint management union committee to study the labor problem.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says skies are expected to be mostly cloudy in all three provinces today. However, clearing will take place in northern New Brunswick this evening.

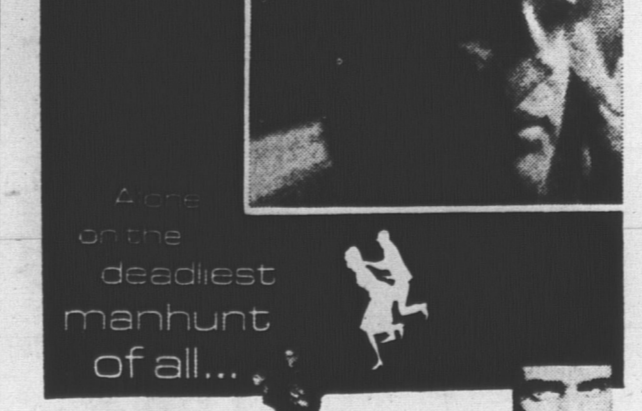
Thursday promises to be sunny with a few cloudy periods in all regions. Temperatures will be mild.

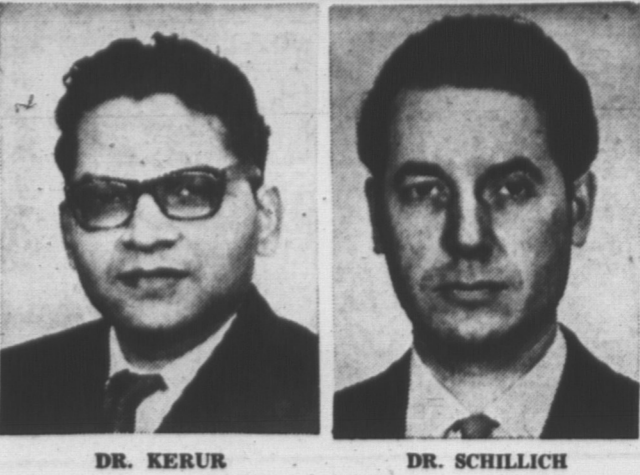

New Taxation Deal Revealed

OTTAWA (CP)—A new British-Canadian taxation agreement establishing the rule that all pensions paid by either country will be taxable only in the country where the recipient lives was announced here by Acting Finance Minister Mitchell Sharp.

The agreement, signed Monday, also provides exemption clauses so persons who were better off under the previous taxation agreement will not be penalized.

Under the old pact, British or Canadian civil service and military pensions were taxable only in the country of source. This meant retired British civil servants or military personnel living in Canada paid the higher British tax.
