FEUD FOUGHT IN COURT — ONE KILLED AND TWO FATALLY INJURED.

WINEVILLE, KY., May 21.—Riley Ball is dead; his uncle Frank Ball and John Hurst probably fatally wounded and Clay Coulson and Flint McDaniel are slightly wounded as a result of an outbreak of the Colson Ball feud in the hall of the Bell county courthouse here today. Five men were arrested.

How the fight started is not known. All of the participants were witnesses in the case of George Colson charged with killing Ira Ball. The case was set for trial tomorrow.

The opposing feudists met in the office of the circuit clerk and immediately opened fire. The ball moved from the clerk's office to the hall and down the stairway to a corridor on the first floor. Riley Ball was instantly killed. Frank Ball was shot through the head and probably will die. Hurst was shot through the abdomen, possibly fatally. Clay Colson received a flesh wound in the shoulder and McDaniel, a spectator, was struck a stray bullet in the foot.

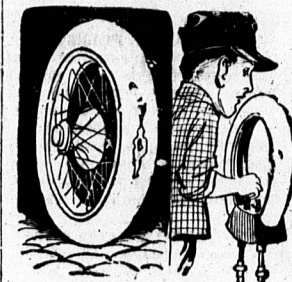
