**COMMITTED SUICIDE.**—Daniel Cotter, a married man about 35 years of age, committed suicide at Oxford, N. S., on Saturday morning. He got up early in the morning and went out on the street. Placing a gun in the picket fence, he so held it that by drawing it the weapon was discharged, the contents entering his left breast. He fell dead. His body lay for some time on the street before being discovered. A coroner's inquest returned a verdict of suicide while temporarily insane. He had a fever for some time ago which left him weak.

**ARCTIC EXPLORATION.**—For forty-five years we had been troubled by the ice, and our situation was becoming desperate. It was not likely that we could hold out forty-five years longer. **SMUGGLER JOHNSON'S PLAN.**—In December last John Schwarz, a Toronto tobacco dealer, got permission to open a bonded warehouse in the cellar of his premises for the storage of Sumatra leaf. Subsequently he leased the warehouse to one Johnson. The warehouse has been stocked pretty well ever since that time with tobacco, and Johnson has disposed of several cases to local cigar makers, passing them in the usual way through the Customs. Nothing seemed out of place, and the officials had no idea that anything was wrong. Since the news of Johnson's arrest an investigation was made of the warehouse. It was discovered that Johnson had broken into the warehouse by the removal of some boards on the floor and had taken away the tobacco and substituted in its place old newspapers. Of 21 cases only 9 contained tobacco, which was seized. Johnson's plan was to have the cases entered in the usual way in bond, and then, as he needed the leaf for his American customers, he removed the flooring from above the warehouse and climbed down into it by means of the step ladder. Removing the tobacco he filled the bales with the old paper.

**Exciting Races.**

A large crowd gathered on the bay ice between St. Peter's Island and Nine Mile Creek on Friday afternoon to test the speed of their horses. The people around here never before saw such a large number of good-looking horses together. The competitors in the first race were as follows:

Chief, owned and driven by W. McEwen; Maud, owned by Neil Livingston and driven by Augustus Dault; Bird, owned and driven by Boyd Livingston; Excitator, owned and driven by Edward Dault; Maud took first place, Chief second, and Bird third. The race was hotly contested and not till five heats had been trotted could the judges decide which should take first place Maud or Chief. Chief, though only four years old showed great speed, which was much admired by all the spectators, and many thought he should have got first place, as it was very hard to decide who should get the second heat. Bird, though eighteen years of age made a good fight.

When the next race was called the following three started: Gleview owned and driven by Edward Currie; Agent, owned and driven by David Livingstone, Charlottetown; Twistie owned and driven by Duncan McEwen. Gleview carried off first prize by two straight heats in which he never skipped. He is only three years old and promises to be speedy. Agent took second place. We expect to see a match race between Maud and Chief in the near future.

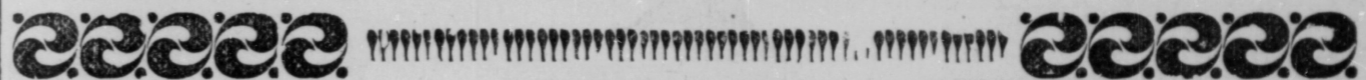
