## Local and Other Items.

CAPTURED A BUTTERFLY.—The St. John Sun says that a live butterfly was captured at Fairville, by a man named Courtney, a day or two ago.

BOLD FOXES.—The farmers of South Essex, Ont., are complaining of the number and boldness of the foxes. Two hunters killed thirteen in one day last week.

FINGERS CUT OFF.—G. D. Campbell of Weymouth N. S., met with a serious accident in his saw mill at the falls on Tuesday last. His right hand was caught in the edging saw and all of the fingers were cut off.

NOT TRUE.—The report that a band of Sioux have left Standing Rock agency with their war paint on, en route to Big Missouri River, has no foundation. Sitting Bull was at the agency on Saturday afternoon and said he had no cause for complaint.

SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION.—Kelly & Lyle's mill at Leavenworth, the largest concern of the kind in Kansas, with an elevator containing 200,000 bushels of wheat, was burned on Monday morning. The loss will be over \$500,000. Spontaneous combustion was probably the cause.

NOT ON BOARD.—The Halifax authorities were advised to watch the Scandinavian and arrest two men supposed to be the murderers of District Inspector Martin of Gwentlo. The steamer was searched on her arrival on Wednesday, but the men described in the despatch were not on board.

SHEEP DROWNED.—The St. Stephen Courier reports the drowning of 37 sheep in one day, at Pond Point, One Island, Grand Manan. The sheep go out on the ledges at low tide, and the in-coming tide surrounds and drowns them. Numbers are drowned every year in this way.

WHISKEY DID IT.—John Goozee, a Barney's River Indian, started from Antigonish with three flasks of liquor on his person. Two were taken from him on the train, but the third one led to the following verdict by a coroner's jury: "Died of the excessive use of intoxicating liquor and exposure to cold."

THE NEWFOUNDLAND BANKS.—At a meeting held at Granville, France, a resolution was adopted favoring an international convention by which steamers would be forbidden to pass over Newfoundland banks during the fishing season. Fishing on the banks is followed by a large number of the inhabitants of Granville.

A SAD ACCIDENT.—Eliza Williams was lighting a fire at the residence of Mrs. Percy Murray, St. Hubert Street, Montreal, when her clothing caught fire and the poor girl was soon enveloped in a mass of flames which were not extinguished before she was burned to death. The flesh in some places was turned to bone.

SHE WAS INSANE.—Mrs. Lizzie McAulay, of Chicago, and her two children were found dead in bed on Monday morning. In the woman's mouth was a rubber tube connecting with a gas jet and the gas was turned on full. The woman shot her husband last December in a fit of jealousy and suffered from a mild form of insanity ever since.

FIRE AT SOURIS.—McLean, Heartz & Co's store was nearly being the scene of a conflagration last evening, caused by the breaking of a lamp. The blind and some articles in the window were soon in a blaze, and, had it not been for the quick action of those present at the time, who conveyed the burning articles to the street, no doubt there would have been a big fire.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION.—Letters from missionaries, dated Zanzibar, Jan. 24, give details of a third revolt in Uganda. King Kiweya, raised to the throne after the overthrow of his brother, King Mwanga, tried to poison his Arab supporters, but the plot failed. He killed two of them at a private audience, and failing to kill the third, he fled. He has since been trying to induce the Christian chiefs to assist him to regain the throne upon which the Arabs placed Kalama, son of Mutassa. The letters confirm the report that an English missionary named Brooks has been murdered.

SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND.—The eighteenth annual report of the Halifax School for the Blind is to hand. The table of attendance shows that 32 blind persons have been under instruction during the past year, 20 of whom were males and 12 females. Of these but one was from the Island. During the past year the school has been free from all contagious diseases, and the general health of the pupils has been good. Superintendent Fraser, in his report, regrets that the Legislature of P. E. Island has not seen fit to deal with the education of "the blind youth of the Island in the same liberal spirit that has characterized the acts of the Legislatures of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick."

## It Benefits the Farmer, Too.

The following facts, collected by the Moncton Times, are to be noted by the farmers of this Province:

"The national policy is a great benefit to the farmer, as it has almost entirely shut out of our markets the grains of the West, which are getting cheaper every year, and if admitted free of duty would now enter into serious competition with the home product. The following table, showing our import for consumption of different products of the farm under the old tariff in 1878 and under the national policy in 1888 will show the effect of the national policy in this respect:

It is clear, therefore, that in addition to the national improvement, the home market for Canadian grown grain has been enlarged by the difference between the imports of 1878 and those of 1888. The market reports show that the price of Canadian oats average ten cents more per bushel on this side of the line than on the American side. Any quantity of Western oats can be purchased in the west for 24 cents per bushel, and as the cost of transportation to the best markets in the east is no greater than it would be from the provinces, that is just what our farmers would be obliged to compete with under unrestricted reciprocity. As a matter of fact the market price for oats in Moncton to-day is from 5 to 10 cents higher per bushel than the Boston price, as we have shown by the quotations. As a leading commercial journal says, remove the duty, introduce the surplus production of the United States, and the value of the farm product of Canada would at once seriously depreciate to the injury of the whole community."

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### Another Letter from Mr. Stevenson

SIR,—I see by your issue of the 26th inst., that "Enquirer" still insists that the Church of Christ, meeting in their house, Upper Great George Street, "must be a Baptist Church." Let us see.

I have already shown how the Apostles established the "Church of Christ." We, as a body of believers, have simply followed the same pattern when establishing the "Church of Christ" in this city. The same Gospel preached produced the same belief. The same repentance followed. We obeyed the same form of doctrine, viz., we were buried with Christ in Baptism, just like the first Christians, who knew only one Lord, one Faith and one Baptism: see Romans, 6th chap. and 4th verse, and 17th and 18th verses, which reads: "But God be thanked, though ye were servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you." "Being then made free from sin" (then and not before Baptism ye were made free from sin, just when they obeyed the form of doctrine). What is this form? See 4th verse: "Therefore we are buried with Him by Baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life;" see Ephesians, 4th chap. 4th and 5th verse: "There is one body, (not two or more different bodies or churches) and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism," (not three kinds of Baptism). In following this pattern to the letter we have reproduced the "Church of Christ" as she came originally from the hands of the Apostles. Let us strive lawfully for the Crown.
