Annual Meeting Of Alberton United Church Congregation

The annual meeting of Alberton United Church of Canada was held Wednesday afternoon in the church building. The meeting was presided over by Rev. Murray Gardner. When the meeting had been declared open for business, Rev. Mr. Gardner was elected chairman and the recording secretary, Roy Leard, was asked to act as secretary of the meeting.

Following reading and approval of the minutes of the last annual congregational meeting, Rev. Mr. Gardner reported for the Session and made reference to the national evangelistic campaign which is now in progress throughout the whole Church.

A report of the Men's Association, read by Earl Atkinson, showed thirty-six members with an average attendance at meetings of thirty. An outline of the routine agenda and names of speakers heard during the year, gave assurance that all meetings had been most interesting and of real value to the members. Projects carried out, included completion of painting exterior of the church building, purchase of books for the men's choir, promotion of cent-a-meal boxes, transportation of members to a special service at Christmas week of prayer, and acceptance of carrying out the Pine Hill campaign, making a contribution to the fund for aid to student ministers, sponsoring of a meeting to which the congregation was invited to hear Rev. Frank McLea speak at a special phase of church work, spring clean-up of church and parsonage grounds, placing a culvert at the parsonage grounds, conducting public worship on conference Sunday and on a Sunday during the minister's illness, and which went to the extent of attending the opening of the new stewardship crusade. J. R. Bonyman has succeeded Dr. O. H. Phillips as president. The secretary for this year is Henry Clarke and the treasurer is Thomas Phillips.

A report of the Guild, prepared by Mrs. Earle Atkinson and read by Mrs. Frances Wallbridge, showed a membership of eighteen. A review of the year's activities showed that the members had made 154 calls in homes and hospitals, sent out 2 cards, served suppers to the Men's Association on several occasions, placed flowers in the church at Easter and Christmas, given them to shut-in folk, held two food sales, distributed sunshine bags among the members, assisted with serving meals at the

exhibition, placed church calendars in homes of the congregation, and sent out several tracts and a sunrise box. Since April there has been a busy mission study at each meeting and in December a joint Christmas meeting with the W. M. S. Auxiliary was held. Generous donations were made to the general funds of the church.

Miss Mabel Fielding reported for the Ladies Aid, which has an enrollment of twenty-five members. Among activities of the year were the serving of supper to the Men's Association, and of a buffet lunch to a Young People's rally. Cookies were provided for the kindergarten class at vacation School Assistance was given with serving of meals at the exhibition. A new rug was purchased for the parsonage and some interior decorating done. Arrangements were made to have the church and hall cleaned and during the summer flowers were arranged for the Sunday services. A dollar-a-family fund was made, a food sale at meetings, in November the Aid arranged a joint enjoyable congregational social. Home and hospital calls were made by the members and a few treats sent out.

The report of the W. M. S. Auxiliary showed a membership of twenty-one, of whom twelve are life members. There are thirty-six associate members. Besides twelve regular monthly meetings, the annual autumn thanksgiving service was held in the church with Dr. Florence Murray of Korea as speaker and director of the minister's vacation members, conducted a service of public worship. Correspondence is carried on with Miss Frances Wallbridge, missionary for special prayer, and with Dr. Sidney Gilchrist.

A highlight of the year was the joint Christmas meeting with the Guild, to which all women of the congregation were invited. Members visited homes and hospitals, sent out cards, letters, treats and gifts as part of their contribution to the life of the congregation and community. With cooperation from other women of the congregation, a box of books was sent to Miss Elma Inman for use in her mission work in Trinidad.

Activities of the Sunday School were carried on as in the previous year. In the summer, a most successful vacation school was conducted by trained leaders.

A financial statement was given by the treasurer, George Gibson and, on motion, a vote of thanks was extended to him for his work during the past year. Stewards elected to replace those whose term of office has expired are: Wesley Hardy, Mrs. James Hodgson and Earle Atkinson (re-elected). Other members of the Board of Stewards are Walter Wells, Reginald Travers, Dr. O. H. Phillips, Roy Leard, Cedric Hunter and Perley Hardy. The constitution of the church was read. All trustees were re-elected — J. R. Bonyman, Frank Weeks, Charles Johnston, Cedric Hunter and H. D. Corbett.

The annual meeting of the pastoral charge, scheduled for next Wednesday, was, by request, postponed until the first Wednesday in February.

The minister announced that the week of prayer will be observed the week beginning January 22nd. The meeting was adjourned and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Gardner.

Summerside Landlords Liable For Water Rates

A meeting of the Summerside Town Council late Thursday night unanimously approved bylaws which will (1) require the installation of proper water and sewerage facilities, by May 1st, in all homes and places of habitation within the town limits where services are available, and (2) will make property owners responsible for the payment of Water and Sewerage rates of tenants who have vacated their places of residence without having paid water bills.

This by-law which, becomes effective April 1st, resulted from the fact that landlords have not kept the Summerside Town Council advised of the movement of tenants and as a result, many tenants were permitted to move, leaving water rates unpaid and depriving the Town of Water and Sewerage revenue.

The meeting, which was presided over by Mayor Wedge, and attended by all members of the Council, was the regular monthly meeting which had been postponed from January 9th because of the recent storm.

SYMPATHY FOR TOWN

Correspondence read by the Clerk, John Cameron, included letters which expressed sympathy in regard to the loss suffered by the town during the sleet storm. These included letters from the Hon. George A. Drew, M.P., National Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party, His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse, His Worship Mayor Stewart, and the members of the Charlottetown City Council; and Floyd Henderson the Mayor of Portage La Prairie.

A letter from the management of radio station CFCY in Charlottetown advised that they had made six repeat performances of an emergency message from Mayor Wedge during the critical period of the storm. The letter advised that they would make no charge for the service and offered whatever assistance their organization could provide at any time.

Mayor Wedge in expressing the grateful appreciation of these messages, said he had received many such messages from points as far west as Vancouver, and that there was not much material assistance that could be given by these persons. Mayor Wedge said that their kind offers of help was much appreciated.

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Alberton United Church Ladies Guild Meeting

The annual meeting of the Alberton United Church Ladies' Guild was held at the home of Mrs. Wesley Hardy Monday, January 16th, with the president, Mrs. O. H. Phillips, presiding. Eleven members and one visitor were present. The meeting opened with devotions followed by the reading of reports by the secretary and treasurer. The friendship secretary reported three cards sent out in December. On motion it was approved that a sum of money be passed over to the church treasurer. It was decided to hold a silent auction at the February meeting.

The nominating committee brought in the following slate of officers for 1956: president, Mrs. Earle Atkinson; vice-president, Mrs. Walter Wells; secretary, Mrs. Beth Waugh; treasurer, Mrs. S. R. Cameron; friendship secretary, Miss Shirley MacArthur.

Mrs. Walter Wells invited the members to her home for the February meeting, and the following committees were appointed: lunch, Mrs. Murray Gardner and Mrs. Roy Leard; devotion, Mrs. O. H. Phillips; program, Mrs. Arthur Wilkie and Miss Shirley MacArthur. A delicious lunch was served by Mrs. Wesley Hardy assisted by co-hostesses. The meeting closed with the Mizpah benediction.

FLUORIDATION

A letter was read from the Home and School Association expressing the Associations support for fluoridation of the Summerside Water Supply. Councillor Clark repeated his support of this suggestion and referred to articles which he had seen in the press in support of this matter. Councillor Perry suggested that a plebiscite be held at the time of the Civic Election to determine the opinion of the citizens.

He referred to the town water supply as being pure and Councillor MacDougall inquired whether he was discussing chlorination or fluoridation. Mayor Wedge, while not opposed to fluoridation, said that he felt that it was too late in the year to suggest that it be taken up by the council.

He cautioned, however, that the town was going to be under terrific financial strain unless some outside aid was received and he thought that some proposed services including garbage collection would have to be deferred.

Mayor Wedge said that the expenses of a new school, a new auditorium, had been incurred in response to popular demand and he suggested that citizens should expect an increase in taxes as was indicated at a recent council meeting.

TO MEET PREMIER

Mayor Wedge announced that a preliminary meeting will be held soon with Premier A.W. Matheson to ascertain what aid can be had in rebuilding the lines, and unless assistance was obtained he expressed concern in regard to how the town would cope with the destructive loss.

Councillor MacDougall suggested that explanations should be made concerning rumors in regard to the delay in receiving poles from Truro for use by the Summerside Electric Light Department and the removal of poles from an area on Water Street East. Mayor Wedge gave a detailed explanation to both matters explaining that after a slight delay due to loading problems, a bill of lading dated January 14th was received on January 16th.

When the poles had not arrived on Wednesday January 18th he had had the shipment traced only to find that they were leaving Truro that evening.

Replying to the other rumor Mayor Wedge said that poles which were in extremely short supply had been placed on a street in the west part of Summerside where they would serve a number of homes, one of which housed a sick woman. These poles were later taken to an area on Water Street where only two homes would have benefited by their use. Having learned of the incident Mayor Wedge requested their return to the street on which they had originally been placed, and said that he took full responsibility for the action.

Councillor Clark inquired regarding rumors as to when the Civic Stadium would resume activities, and Mayor Wedge said that it was hoped to have the rink in operation by next Wednesday, but that this would be conditional on when power was fully restored to homes within the town.

DIES UNDER AX

BELMONT, Mass. (AP) — Miss Ethel McCoy, 56-year-old librarian at Harvard University business school, was hacked to death with an ax in her bed Friday. Police took into custody her 37-year-old father, Hugh A. McCoy. Police Chief William G. Heyd said his elderly parent, a retired telephone worker, would be arraigned on a murder charge.

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BACK STRETCH

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Young Forests Best For Game Preserves

OTTAWA (CP)—Hunting wasn't necessarily better in the so-called good old days.

Th ancient virgin forests thick with tall, mature trees through which Canada's early explorers made their way were not thick with game, says Victor E. F. Solman, assistant chief of the Canadian wildlife service here. About the only game such forests will support is the quail.

The huge trees choke out all other vegetation and their own branches are too high for the hungry deer, moose or elk to reach them.

Experienced hunters likely know this already, but Mr. Solman's statements, in an interview, may surprise the fledgling.

YOUNG FORESTS BEST

The best game forests, he said, are the young ones, with small trees sparse enough to allow grass and other vegetation to grow on the forest floor. Stands of hardwood trees—maple, poplar, oak, birch and the like—provide the most food for deer, moose, elk, woodland caribou and other game.

There are large areas in Banff and Jasper national parks, for example, where the forests are solid with lodgepole pine. But for game they are foodless deserts. Evergreen coniferous forests, once they have grown so dense that the shrubby beneath them is blotted out, offer virtually no food supply.

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
