With the province some 3000 behind so far this year on its quota of blood donors, the dire necessity of exceeding the quota at the two remaining series of clinics was stressed by the Charlottetown chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee, A. Fremont Archer, Wednesday evening. The occasion was the presentation of trophies to representatives of the winners of the various Charlottetown competitions for "blood donor supremacy" at a well attended and enthusiastic meeting held at Red Cross headquarters convened by Mrs. A. J. Haslam and Mrs. Fred L. Macmillan.

When accepting the Bankers' trophy on behalf of the Bank of Montreal which had 100 per cent attendance of eligible donors at last April's clinics in Charlottetown, Dwight Nowlan, blood donor chairman for this bank, stated that he had sent out a letter of "challenge" to the other banks on Wednesday, stating that he plans to follow this up by personal contacts, in the hope of a better response from the bankers at this fall's clinics.

Valerie Bowness, a member of the fourth year class at Prince of Wales College, was the recipient of the PWC blood donor shield which last April was up for competition between the girls and the boys and was captured by the girls who had a slight margin over the boys. The Armed Services' Club trophy went back to the Main Branch Naval Veterans' Association which had a 1 per cent lead over last fall's winners — and was presented to Joseph LeClair on behalf of the naval veterans club.

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Construction Begins At Gulf Garden Estates

GEORGETOWN — Work on the erection of the large, fully-integrated Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. plant here got underway yesterday. The eight and one-half acre site was cleared and the construction company opened an office on Water Street Monday. The same day a representative from National Employment Services in Charlottetown was in Georgetown taking applications from prospective workers.

Trucks delivered lumber to the site on Tuesday evening and a quantity of steel bars used for reinforcing concrete foundations was brought in. A number of carpenters and laborers were engaged on Wednesday. The area is fast taking on an air of intense activity.
