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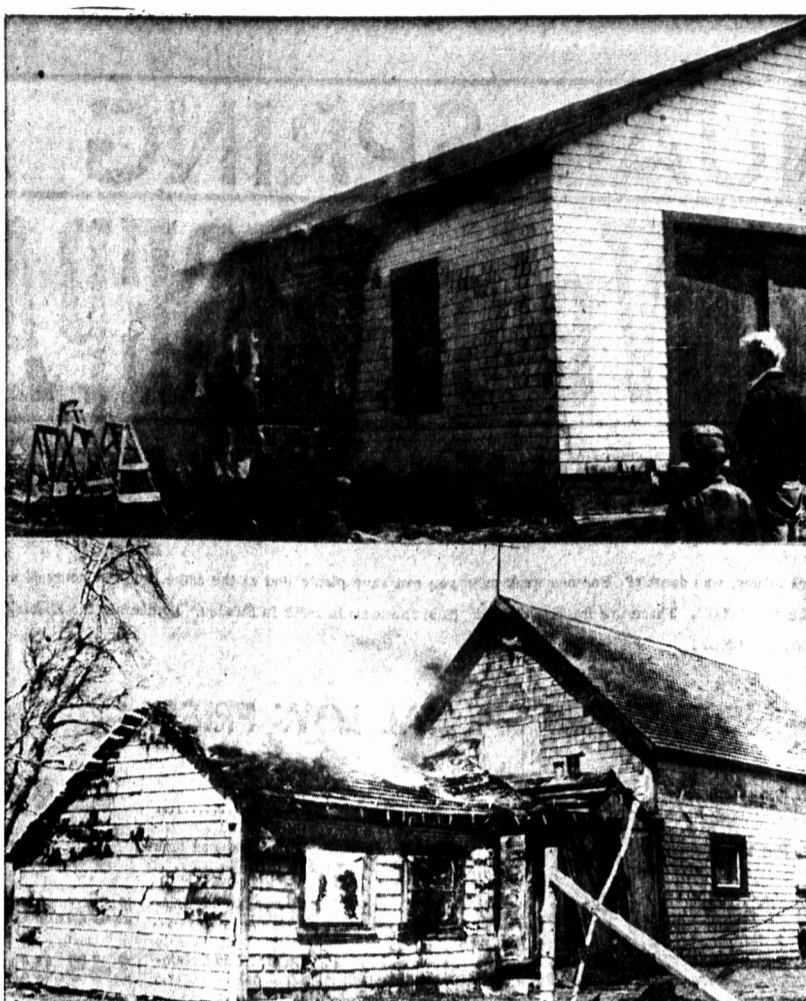
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TWO FIRES AT ALBERTON

The two buildings, shown on fire above at Alberton Wednesday, were both saved from destruction by hard work on the part of neighbours and members of the Alberton Fire Brigade. The 80 x 30 workshop owned by Howard Clark and used for building boats was heavily damaged
