(Continued from page 1) dous increase in the school age population of Charlottetown, an undue financial strain on Charlottetown citizens has been incurred in providing school accommodation, a resolution passed by the members, asked "the provincial government, which publicly promised to save the City \$165,000 for teachers' supplements and has provided less than half that sum, should now perform on its promise which would result in additional funds for school accommodation."

Another resolution that was passed condemned the government for not making "the Charlottetown waterfront burn with activity as promised."

Referring to the annual report of the Hospital Services Commission in which it was stated that one-half million dollars was withdrawn from its funds and placed in investments, another resolution condemned the provincial government for permitting such "irresponsible use of funds, which should be used to provide hospitalization benefits for the people of this province rather than the investment of same to produce income for the Commission."

## Baptist Church To Reduce Debt, Make Improvements

A budget to substantially reduce the church debt and provide for various improvements was adopted at the 106th annual meeting of the First United Baptist Church last evening.

The treasurer's report given by S.H. Burhoe showed a total raised of \$57,000 with a present total indebtedness of approximately \$122,000. With the building of the parsonage the way is open to sell the entire property of the old church and parsonage, and the proceeds should substantially reduce the building debt as well as the carrying charges, it was felt.

The total resident membership now stands at 646. The report of the Sunday School, presented by R.J. Rupert, showed a total membership of 375, exclusive of the cradle roll which numbers 147. Mr. Rupert outlined some of the immediate needs in the way of equipment and space additions to make the facilities more fully functional.

Rev. Harold L. Milton, in his report expressed his personal gratitude and that of the congregation to Capt. and Mrs. Carl Burke, donors of the new parsonage. He also thanked the church staff, leaders and workers.

Mrs. Gloria Atkinson, as youth work director, reporting on the youth fellowships from ages 12 to 25, indicating that the work is expanding and immeasurable good is being accomplished, although there are still many young people of the church not participating in the activities available.

**MISSIONARY FUND**  
The outreach of the church from a missionary and extension standpoint showed a record year, thanks to the work of the various missionary groups and the tithing practice of many members. In addition to the record amount contributed for local church maintenance and the building indebtedness, the missionary and extension giving totalled more than \$8,000.

The meeting tendered a unanimous vote of thanks to the pastor, Mr. Milton, mentioning his election as president of Maritime Baptists.

## Art Show Is Scheduled Here Jan. 22

Arrangements for the Maritime art exhibition to be held in Montgomery Hall Jan. 22 to Feb. 1 were discussed at the regular meeting of the P.E.I. Art Society which was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Gass, Jan. 16.

The president, Miss Eleanor Lowe, conducted the business meeting which was followed by a program in which Mrs. Gass described the work of Henri Matisse (1869-1954) the leader of the Fauves movement in art. She told how this style represented a reaction to the new impressionism, and how they used a freer outlet in pigment than the meticulous pointillist method or the painstaking method of Cezanne.
