## Brochure Planned By S'side Board

### SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

The Summerside Board of Trade decided at its monthly meeting last night at the Prince County Vocational School that it would go ahead with plans to publish a brochure about Summerside and have it ready for distribution before the major centennial celebrations begin in 1964.

A 16-page outline copy of the proposed brochure was presented before the meeting by committee chairman Amos Hubley, and the possibilities of its publication were discussed at length by the board members.

The brochure will consist of pictures, descriptions and maps of Summerside and has the objective of attracting new industry and tourists to the area.

"With the activities that will be taking place in P.E.I. in 1964," said Mr. Hubley, "there is no limit to the number of tourists a well presented brochure could attract to our area."

A resolution was passed to ask the department of highways to repair the shoulders of Highway 100 from Summerside to St. Eleanors near the coming winter.

It will also be requested of the department that a flashing amber light be placed at the St. Eleanors corner facing east and west and a similar flashing light but red, be placed facing west.

In regard to the dredging of Summerside Harbour, Alex Campbell said he had received a letter from the department of public works saying that this dredging work would be done.

Development of the Mt. Pleasant airport was suggested in a brief from Island Flying Services. It was pointed out that the airport could be used for tourist stops, freight service and emergency landings.

A brief from Dr. G.E. Robins dealt with the historical development of the county, present-day conditions and suggested improvements.

Next public hearing in the series is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon at 8 p.m. Oct. 8. At least six briefs are expected from local organizations.

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# Automobile Ownership Said High In Province

From a booklet entitled "Facts and Figures of the Automotive Industry" it has been learned that Prince Edward Island ranks ahead of four other provinces in the number of motor vehicles owned per capita.

The island has a vehicle for every 3.2 people ranking it ahead of Nova Scotia (3.7), New Brunswick (4.0), Quebec (4.2) and Newfoundland (6.3). The Canadian average is 3.2.

Saskatchewan at 2.5 has the most vehicles per population. It is followed by Alberta 2.6; British Columbia 2.7; Ontario 2.9 and Manitoba 3.0.

The booklet published by the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce also shows that the island's gasoline tax is the second highest in the nation at 18 cents, led only by Newfoundland and Nova Scotia each at 19 cents. Lowest is in the Northwest Territories (4½ cents) and Quebec (21 cents).

While the number of outlets for retail gasoline outlets decreasing on the island, going against the Canadian trend which shows a slight increase over the last five year period, P.E.I. had 302 gasoline outlets in 1958 compared with 283 in 1952.

Pontiac was the most popular car with Islanders in 1962 according to new motor vehicle registrations. Out of 1,689 new registrations 239 were Pontiac. A total of 234 new Chevrollets were registered and 203 Volkswagens.

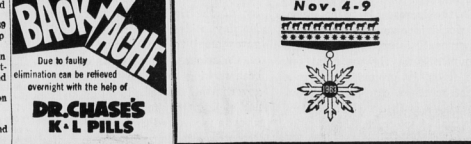

## Apartment is Gutted on North River Road

Fire breaking out at about 2:15 yesterday afternoon gutted a ground floor bachelor apartment in the northern wing of the Harwood Apartments on North River Road.

The city fire department extinguished the fire within half an hour. Occupant of the apartment, Frank Johnston, was at work when the fire began.

The landlord, Albert R. Oop, said that he had been in the apartment above that of the Johnston's helping a new tenant, Mrs. Hilda Harper, hang a mirror, when he smelled smoke.

He went downstairs and tried to enter the apartment, but was unable due to the dense smoke and flames, which seemed to have been coming mostly from a chesterfield and the living room.

He then sent in the alarm to the fire department.

Mr. Rop received cuts on both hands in smothering a window at the back of the apartment.

Apartmenters directly above sustained smoke damage, but the fire did not spread to any of the 35 other apartments in the building.

Late yesterday afternoon Fire Inspector Louis Ranshan reported that from preliminary investigation, it is suspected that the possible cause of the blaze was a cigarette.

Damage to the building itself was reported to be completely covered by insurance but the contents, owned by the tenant are not.

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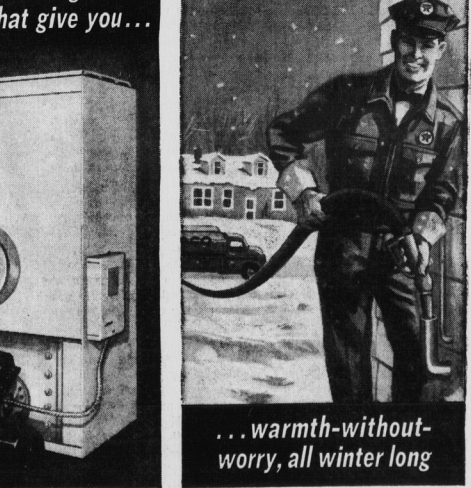

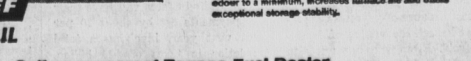
