## Alcohol and Early Death.

CHILDREN OF HABITUAL DRINKERS ARE INCAPABLE OF RESISTING DISEASE.

Editor of the Voice:  
The questions you ask relate to very common facts observed constantly. From 70 to 80 per cent. of all alcoholic and opium inebriates have a marked heredity, dating from moderate or excessive drinking parents or grandparents, or diseases of the brain and nervous system.

Theoretically and literally to a degree that is as nearly absolute as anything can be in science, the degeneration from the use of alcohol moderately, or in excess, as a beverage, is transmitted to the next generation. Not always in a crava for drink, but in constitutional defects of brain and nervous system, in lowered vitality, defective vigor and lessened power of resistance to disease.  
Many very ardent temperance workers are children of drinking parents, but they are always defective in many ways. They often become insane from slight causes, break down in early life, and are chronic invalids ever after. Many parents with an insane tendency have inebriate and consumptive children. All moderate use of spirits makes children more apt to become insane or consumptive from the slightest exciting causes, or be excessive users of spirits. The children of moderate drinkers are less able to bear the strains and drains of modern civilization; hence they are early exhausted and find relief from alcohol and opium and other narcotics. The evidence of this fact is in the observation of every one, and beyond all question. In fifteen years' constant study of these cases, I have never seen a family of moderate drinkers that was followed by robust, healthy children. I have seen some very bright children from such parents in some cases, but in every instance they died out early, from some degeneration which a more vigorous race would have overcome. I believe no fact can be sustained by more conclusive evidence than this. The children of moderate or excessive users of spirits are always weakly and of more unstable brain and nervous system; more likely to be inebriates, to suffer from nervous diseases, to be insane, to die of consumption, to be defective in every way, and to die early.
