**STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT.**—The cases of Alexander McCannell, George Drew, David Stanley and James Offer, for carrying firearms on the 12th inst., were disposed of yesterday morning. McCannell, Drew and Stanley were held to bail on their own recognizance and the sum of \$200 each to appear before the Magistrate on the 27th of August next, for his decision in the matter. Prosecution in the case of James Offer was withdrawn. Archd. Ramsay, for the same offence, and who was reported in yesterday's proceedings as on bail for Supreme Court, was also held for decision on 27th August.

The Grand Division quarterly session passed off very pleasantly at West River the day before yesterday. Several matters of important interest to the cause were brought forward and disposed of. These will hereafter be made public. The public meeting in the evening was well attended. Addresses were given by Councillor Harris, G. W. P., who occupied the chair, J. B. Cooper, G. S.; J. J. **ARREST OF A CANADIAN THIEF.**—George Raynes, of Montreal, was arrested at Baltimore on the 26th inst., with \$2,390 in fresh \$10 bills of the Consolidated Banks of Canada and Montreal. It is believed that the money is part of \$22,000, stolen from the Grand Trunk Railway office in Montreal last June.

**AN IMPORTANT SUIT FOR \$2.50.**—A case of considerable interest was tried last Monday at Chatham. Mr. Alex. Morrison sued Judge Peters, of P. E. Island, for \$2.50, amount paid for a deed which he alleged should not have been charged him. A verdict was given him after a lengthy trial.—*St. John Telegraph.*

**SUMMERSIDE.**—Our correspondent made a mistake in stating that the *Island boat* was behind in the race with the *Secret*. We are informed that the *St. Lawrence* left Shediac a few minutes in advance of the *Secret*, kept the lead, and arrived in Summerside a few minutes before the steamer in chase. The *Secret*, we may remark, has the reputation of being one of the fastest boats plying in the Gulf.

CHATHAM, Cape Cod, July 18.—It is reported here that the brig *Quango*, before reported in tow of the schr. *United States*, was abandoned on Saturday night about 10 miles S.E. from Fishing Rip, the schr. being unable to tow her. The brig had a cargo of sugar and lignumvite, and has been partly stripped of rigging, etc.

**THE FISHERY QUESTION.**

The *Boston Advertiser* says:—"The contention of the Canadians, that they grant more than they receive, has never been admitted. It is not for us to admit it, but for them to prove it. We must, of course, make as much as we can of our side, but without resorting to any devices that savor of pettifoggery. Fortunately our case is in such good hands that we need have no apprehensions of the conduct of the case before the commission. It is not for that we have fears, but for the course of Congress when the award is made. Nobody would be greatly surprised if there should be an award against us, assented to by two of the three arbitrators. Let the American commissioner try never so hard to be impartial, and he cannot wholly succeed. Even the lord chief justice of England failed to see what all the world but Great Britain admitted in the Alabama claims controversy. The provision in the treaty for a third arbitrator assumes that the other two will be divided on the question, and no discredit to them either. As a matter of strict interpretation, no doubt the omission to make a majority award binding gives the United States a right to refuse to be bound by anything but a unanimous verdict. But would it be high-minded on our part to take advantage of such a narrow technicality? We say, no. Either Great Britain deliberately plotted to trick Canada into the belief that her grievance was to be redressed, knowing all the time that it was a delusion, or the failure to provide for the validity of a majority award was an unintentional omission. The former supposition is not to be considered for a moment, and there is no avoiding the latter as the true explanation of the omission. Let criminal lawyers, defending guilty clients, have the honor of defeating justice by taking advantage of technical flaws, all to themselves. The United States cannot afford to resort to such expedients."
