

Saints Advance To Finals Defeating Montague 5-2

Last night at the Sports Arena St. Dunstan's University whipped Montague Primroses 5-2 to advance to the finals of the Island Senior B hockey league against either Parkdale or Basilia Youth Club.

The Saints went about their job in a worklike way and built up a 4-0 lead in the first two periods of play. Arnold Mullins set up the only goal of the first period when he carried down the ice and into the corner. He passed back to Roy who was standing right in front.

At 15:56 in the second period Buck Davey scored on a "Davey Special" as he blasted a wicked shot from just inside the blueline that beat Ward cleanly.

Sheer determination on the part of Gaston Roy enabled the Saints to take a 3-0 lead at 16:16. Roy battled for the puck in the corner and fought his way in front of the Montague cage where he drew out Ward and deposited the puck behind him.

Came From Behind Detroit Wings Nip Leafs 3-2

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit Red Wings exploded for three goals within five minutes of the third period Tuesday night to overcome a two-goal deficit and defeat Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 in the opener of their Stanley Cup semi-final hockey series.

Until the last-ditch flurry, it was all Toronto, with the Leafs out-fighting and outscrambling the second-place Red Wings at every turn.

George Armstrong had given them a one-goal lead in the first period and Ron Stewart had added the second tally in the middle frame, scoring his first goal in three years of Stanley Cup competition.

But the Red Wings came to life as the third period got under way. Each team has a man short who is Gordie Howe, the leading Detroit scorer, brought them to life when he took a short passout from Red Kelly at :58 and barreled in a goal from 10 feet out.

From there on in the Wings were in command all the way, pressuring and forcing Toronto goalie Harry Lumley into lunging efforts. Detroit took the lead on two brilliant plays less than a minute apart. Centre Alex Delvecchio carried in along the right boards and flipped a passout to winger John Bucyk who smashed it at 5:12.

Just 4 seconds later, the inspired Wings scored again. Once again it was Delvecchio's work that gave the Wings the goal.

GRABS LOOSE PUCK
