**Games Played Saturday In National League**

**MONTREAL 12, CHICAGO 2**  
MONTREAL, March 11 — (CP) — Montreal Canadiens lifted themselves into Stanley Cup playoff contention here on Saturday night when they mauled Chicago Black Hawks 12-2 in a free-scoring National Hockey League fixture.

The victory moved Montreal into a fourth place tie with Boston Bruins, who dropped a 5-3 decision to Toronto Maple Leafs. Bert Olmstead and Maurice (Rocket) Richard were the big opportunists as Canadiens took full advantage of the weakened, lowly Hawks, each scoring three times.

The one-sided affair, attended by 14,433 fans, saw Canadiens pour goals past goalie Harry Lumley, who was practically deserted by his teammates. Chicago went scoreless until the third period when they showed their only signs of life in the game.

**TORONTO 5, BOSTON 3**  
TORONTO, March 11 — (CP) — Boston Bruins, dropping a 5-3 decision to Toronto Maple Leafs before 13,085 fans, lost ground Saturday night in their battle for one of the four playoff positions in the National Hockey League. Veteran Ted Kennedy had a major hand in fashioning the Toronto triumph, scoring two

goals. His second—in the third period—turned out the winner over the persistent Bruins who battled it out to the finish.

The setback forced Bruins at least temporarily to share fourth place in the standings with Montreal Canadiens. The night's results left them one point behind the third-place Rangers, the third team in the fight to get into the Stanley Cup playoffs. All three teams went into action again tonight.

**DETROIT 3, NEW YORK 2**  
DETROIT, March 11 — (AP) — Ted Lindsay's third-period goal brought Detroit Red Wings a 3-2 victory over New York Rangers in a National Hockey League game Saturday night before 13,680 fans. Emil (The Cat) Francis was in the New York nets for the third straight game, subbing for injured Chuck Rayner who is due back in the line-up tonight to play against Montreal at New York. The victory kept Detroit's N. H. L. lead at eight points, while New York stayed in third place by one point over deadlocked Boston and Montreal.

Detroit once held a 2-0 lead, but lost it when Fat Egan scored a pair of goals from long range. Lindsay's decisive counter with 13 minutes left was a pure fluke. He was behind the Ranger net when he threw the puck into a goal-mouth scramble. It hit the back of Frankie Eddolls' leg and bounced back between the pads of the surprised Francis.

His rink can adapt itself to either style. His mate, the third-stone specialist, is George Hansen, 31-year-old native of Saskatchewan.

Time and again in yesterday morning's round Hansen took out Manitoba's shot rock or placed his stone deep in the house.

**First In 24 Years**

The Maritimes' first and only win after a lapse of 24 years came back to Nova Scotia. The late Murray MacNeill, in 1927, skipped his Halifax Curling Club to the title. No other Maritimes Province has since been able to win.

Since then the West has practically taken charge of the championship disposition except for two wins by Ontario and a well earned win, with seven wins and two defeats, by Northern Ontario last year at Vancouver.

Next year's title play will be in Winnipeg, and the following year at Sudbury, Ont., when Northern Ontario will become the host for the first time.

The extra round play last night was curtailed to 10 ends — the first two ends were declared dead.

Johnny Franklin's Rosetown, Sask., edged out Manitoba 9-7 but lost to Chesser's British Columbia entry 8-0 in the deciding game for the runner-up place behind Nova Scotia.

Franklin graciously conceded his loss after six scoreless ends and

the formal presentation of the Macdonald's Brier tankard to Nova Scotia followed immediately. All the Provincial rinks were on hand for the final colorful ceremony.

**The Kentville Rink**

The 1951 championship team from Kentville is made up of comparatively young curlers who won the Western Counties — Valley and South Shore — title in Nova Scotia last year.

Oyer, at 42, is the daddy of the rink. Hansen, the mate, who began curling as a high school student in Lunenburg, Sask., is only 31. He was formerly with the R. C. M. P. Second stone is Fred Dyke, 28, an accountant. He is a former amateur baseball pitcher and began curling when 15.

Lead of the rink is Wally Knock, both "k" and "n" pronounced under the inalterable dictation in Lunenburg where he was born. He is 37, has been curling for seven years and is the operator of a fish market in Kentville.
