Trans-Atlantic Mail Service.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18. A sub-Committee of Council are considering imperial despatches bearing on the proposed improvements in the Trans-Atlantic mail service. It is understood that the recent imperial subsidy of the Pacific steamers was granted on condition that the Canadian Government take measures to improve the trans-Atlantic service. It is rumored in London that the Canadian Pacific contemplates establishing a mail service to Australia, provided the Imperial authorities give them the contract. They will undertake to convey the mails from Liverpool to Brisbane in thirty-one days.

BERLIN, Oct. 18. The municipalities to-day presented the Empress Frederic with an address in grateful recognition of the Emperor Frederic's efforts to develop the Empire. The precise objects of the proposed institute will be left to the discretion of the Empress. The Empress appeared deeply moved. She expressed heartfelt thanks, and said she would do the utmost to make the institute useful. The foundation of the Mausoleum of the Emperor Frederic at Potsdam was laid to-day.

When McNulty was arrested at San Francisco on the charge of murder, his aged mother went on from Portland in the hope of being able to do something for him. As the sentence of the court was pronounced, she rushed forward and clasping her downy hair on her bosom, cried out wildly: "My son! My son! Oh, Johnny, Johnny, you will have to hang, and I won't be able to save you after I have come so far. Oh, why did you leave me, my poor boy!" And again she uttered the same heart-rending cry. McNulty gently removed his mother's arms and tried to comfort her. He told her to hope, and said that everything was for the best. The mother continued her low moans, and the young babe in the arms of McNulty's wife, who was seated near him, added to the pitiful sound its own voice, crowing loudly and dancing on its mother's knee, who tried in vain, through her tears, to quiet it. The scene was very affecting one. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court.
