Police Veteran Dies In Ontario

At his home, 141 East 38th Street, Hamilton, Ont., Police Veteran Donald Angus Stewart died suddenly on April 2nd in his 55th year. Constable Stewart was born in Lewis, P.E.I., eldest son of Mrs. Annie Stewart, of Lewis and Montague, and the late Donald Stewart. He moved to Hamilton in his youth and had been with the Hamilton City Police for some thirty years. He was always known to be a polite and courteous officer and had the knack of dealing with people, whether it was a citizen coming in with a complaint or for information, or a prisoner that he had to book into cells.

He was an active member of St. Enoch's Presbyterian Church, and of the Police Athletic Association. He was also a member of L.O.L. 19 Sir John A. Macdonald Lodge.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing wife, the former Marie Cooper; two daughters, Muriel (Mrs. Harry Cooper) of Cleveland, Ohio and Gene (Mrs. Gordon Thomas) of Hamilton, and four grandchildren. His Mother: two brothers, Wallace of Belle River, P.E.I. and Alexander of Montague; four sisters, Margaret (Mrs. Arthur Hargrove) residing in West Newton, Mass.; Florence (Mrs. D. D. Emery), Wood Islands, Christone (Mrs. Wm. Llewellyn), Gasperaux, and Isabel (Mrs. Murdoch Beaton) of Montague.

The remains were laid to rest at Truscott Brothers Funeral Home where many hundreds filed by the coffin and from where the Orange Lodge service was conducted. The remains were then conveyed to St. Enoch's Presbyterian Church where the funeral service was held with Rev. DiGangi officiating, who spoke feelingly of the deceased and comforting words to the bereaved.

Funeral procession in which the R.C.M.P., Ontario Provincial Police and the Hamilton City Police were all represented in the Guard of Honour proceeded to Eastlawn Cemetery.

FOUR JORDANIANS HANGED
AMMAN, Jordan (Reuters)—Four Jordanians were publicly hanged Wednesday, as Israeli spies. The executions were carried out at dawn in Amman, Nablus, Hebron and Tulkarem, home towns of the four. The bodies were left on the gallows for two hours afterwards. They were sentenced to death by a court-martial last September.

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
