Some Appointments.
OTTAWA, Oct. 24.
Judge Taylor has been appointed Chief Justice of Manitoba, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Hon. Lewis Wallace.
It is understood that no change will be made in the Lieutenant-Governorship of Manitoba and the North-west territories before next May, the present incumbents remaining in office until at least that time.
The appointment of J. B. Rolland, of Montreal, to the vacancy in the Senate created by the death of Senator Senechal, is officially confirmed.
Military Precautions.
LONDON, Oct. 24.
Advices from St. Petersburg indicate that Russia is taking the most elaborate military precautions. An Ukase will be shortly issued embodying regulations for the protection of all strategic railways in Southern Russia. It removes all employees on these roads who are not of the orthodox Greek faith and members of the Established Church of the Empire. The object is to secure absolute loyalty to Russia on the part of those engaged on these important lines of communication along the frontier.
Lord Hartington's Speech.
LONDON, Oct. 24.
Lord Hartington delivered a speech at Nottingham this evening. He described the Liberal federation as nothing but a man association, without a national character. He reiterated that the question of disestablishment of the church in Scotland ought to be settled by popular will but not so the Welsh disestablishment which could not be separated from English disestablishment, as Gladstone himself formerly argued when the question was raised.
Arranging a Meeting.
BUCHAREST, Oct. 24.
M. Stambuloff is coming to Bucharest on a mission from Prince Ferdinand to arrange a meeting between Ferdinand and the Kings of Roumania and Servia. The latter favor such an interview as tending to promote an entente cordiale aiming at the suppression of intrigues, which are a common danger to the three states.
Precautions Against Cholera.
OTTAWA, Oct. 24.
Dr. LaChapelle, President of the Provincial Board of Health, states that every precaution is being taken to prevent the introduction of cholera. Steamers arriving especially from Mediterranean ports are closely watched, and, as the autumn fleet is now coming in every precaution will be taken.
Royalty on the Move.
LONDON, Oct. 24.
It is now certain that the Czar will visit Berlin, and that the Kaiser has returned to be in readiness to welcome him. Convincing proof comes in the form of intelligence from Copenhagen that the Czar has consented to the meeting, which is brought about wholly through German solicitation.
The Franco-English Convention.
PARIS, Oct. 24.
La Republique Francaise, referring to the convention between France and England regarding the Suez Canal says: "The neutralization of the Canal means the neutralization in the early future of Egypt and the resumption of cordial relations between France and England."
More Fever Reported.
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 24.
A despatch reports 23 new cases of fever and two deaths to-day. More physicians and nurses are expected to-night. The weather is warmer and the fever is spreading.
Fire at Rideau Hall.
OTTAWA, Oct. 24.
Fire broke out in the Governor-General's sitting-room at Rideau Hall yesterday, and damaged the building and furniture considerably before it was extinguished.
Snow and Cold.
DEADWOOD, Dak., Oct. 24.
Snow fell last night to a depth of 15 inches. The thermometer is 16 below zero.
