K. B. STEWART, ENGINEER, DIES

Kenneth Bruce Stewart, 58, a resident of Winnipeg for 40 years, died Friday in the General Hospital. He resided at 553 Jubilee Ave. Mr. Stewart was born in Park Corner, P. E. I., July 29, 1880. He came to Toronto in 1899, and settled in Winnipeg. He was first employed by the Canadian Pacific railway, and in 1915 he joined the Greater Winnipeg Water District line. He was employed as a dragline engineer for a number of years and recently as a gasoline engineer.

He was a life member of the Ancient Landmark Lodge, A. F. and A. M. Mr. Stewart is survived by his widow, four sons, Allison, William, James and Walter; and six daughters, Mrs. W. McKinnon, Mrs. Charles Knox, Mrs. R. M. Gunn, Irene, Betty and Leslie, all of Winnipeg; his mother, in Prince Edward Island; two brothers and four sisters. The funeral of the late K. B. Stewart was held on Monday, July 24th following his death which occurred on the Friday previous. The service was held in the Masonic Chapel, which is one of the largest buildings in Winnipeg and was filled with sympathetic friends from the city and other parts of the Province. Mr. Stewart was a member of the Presbyterian Church and was visited daily by his Pastor during the last period of his illness. Winnipeg has lost to rest one of its finest citizens.

KING AND QUEEN TASTED THIS SAUCE

LONDON-When the King and Queen dined at the American Embassy recently Cumberland sauce was on the menu served with Virginia ham. This is one of the best sauces you can serve with either hot or cold boiled ham, and it also goes very well with cold beef. One way of cooking your ham is to boil it in the ordinary way, then, 10 minutes or so before it has finished cooking, take it out of the saucepan, remove the rind, set in

another flat oven dish, and pour over a quarter of a pint of port wine. Put in roasting oven and finish cooking, basting frequently with the wine. This you will find gives the ham a very pleasant color and a most succulent color. Then strain off the port and use for the sauce. For the sauce melt two dessertspoons of red currant jelly in a saucepan, add about a quarter of a pint of port and a dessert spoon of chopped onion. (The onion should have previously been boiled; it will cook perfectly well whole with the ham; afterwards drain and chop finely.) Meanwhile grate a teaspoon each of orange and lemon peel, boil the peel until soft in a little hot water, strain and add to the juice of one orange and half a lemon, about a teaspoon or more of powdered ginger, pepper and some powdered ginger. The amount of the ingredients depends on personal taste. The more and spicier you like it the more mustard and ginger you can add. Finally, drop in a few salted capers for a little white and serve hot or cold.
