A prominent resident of the community passed away in the Prince County Hospital Wednesday morning in the person of Major T.H.E. Inman. He was in his 77th year.

The late Mr. Inman was born at North St. Eleanor's a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Inman of that place. He grew up and attended school in that community.

He enlisted in the army in the First World War and after service overseas was discharged with the rank of major. During his service career he served as second in command of his regiment in England. After the war he returned to North St. Eleanor's and took up farming and fox ranching. He was also prominently engaged in the oyster fishing. About twenty years ago he retired and moved to Summerside where he lived until his death.

He was an active church worker a member of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion and a member of Hiram and Lebanon Lodge, No. 3 A.F. and A.M.
