

**Charleton Heston  
Not Typed 20th  
Century Player**

HOLLYWOOD LAP — Char-  
leton Heston, who likes it here, is  
making his first all-California  
movie since The Big Country  
seven years ago.  
He would like to spend more  
time in the land of his adoption,  
but producers don't like him as  
a 20th century man.  
"All the good modern parts  
go to Jack Lemmon and Cary  
Grant," he laments.  
"That leaves Heston with pic-  
tures like The Ten Command-  
ments, Ben-Hur, El Cid and  
The Agony and the Ecstasy.  
He's not seeking sympathy.  
He has established a near-  
monopoly on costume epics. He  
has probably done more than  
anyone else to overcome prej-  
udice to such films, as ex-  
pressed in the words of a  
theatre chain boss: "Don't give  
me any of those pictures where  
they write with feathers."  
**GOOD THING GOING**  
Heston himself admits he has  
a good thing going.  
"When you see Jack Lemmon  
at the beginning of a picture  
walking down the halls of a big  
office building, you immedi-  
ately believe in him as the  
junior executive of a corpora-  
tion," he said. "And when  
people see me on horseback in  
chain-mail, they seem to be-  
lieve that I belong there."  
"Some actors are obviously  
contemporary types and they  
can't pull it off. When you're  
wearing chain-mail, you'd damn  
well better convince the audi-  
ence that you wear chain-mail  
underwear, too."  
Right now he's back in the  
11th century, the era of El Cid.  
This time he's playing a Nor-  
man warrior in The War Lord.  
Cost of The War Lord: \$5-  
000,000.

**Excessive  
Vitamin D  
Said Danger**

BALTIMORE (AP) — A Johns  
Hopkins pediatrician said here  
that a significant cause  
of mental retardation in infants  
is excessive intake of vitamin D  
by certain pregnant mothers.  
Dr. Robert E. Cooke, pediat-  
rician-in-chief and director of  
the department of pediatrics at  
Johns Hopkins, said there should  
be a survey by pregnant women  
with their doctors of the amounts  
of vitamin D they consume.  
He emphasized at a press con-  
ference that not all mothers are  
sensitive to vitamin D. But he  
said that excessive intake of it  
by those who are is "a signifi-  
cant cause of retardation of the  
more severe forms and cer-  
tainly one of the most common  
preventable causes."  
In addition to mental retar-  
dation, Dr. Cooke said, an ex-  
cess of vitamin D apparently  
causes narrowing of major  
blood vessels of the body, kid-  
ney ailments, heart murmurs,  
and high blood pressure.

**Water Pollution  
Seen Tourist  
Industry Threat**

OTTAWA (CP) — Pollution of  
Canada's water resources poses  
a threat to the Canadian Tour-  
ist industry, the federal provin-  
cial tourist conference has been  
told.  
Dr. Albert E. Berry, sec-  
retary-treasurer of the Cana-  
dian Institute on Pollution Con-  
trol, said water pollution has  
become a national problem  
challenging "our very existence  
and our national welfare."  
A program to control pollution,  
had always lacked public sup-  
port.  
"Until we can impress thor-  
oughly upon the public the im-  
portance of this support our ef-  
forts are likely to fall short of  
our objectives."  
Dr. Berry said "apart from  
the need for protecting our own  
citizens, we must think of the  
great recreational facilities of  
Canada and the lure of the tour-  
ist."  
"Water pollution is one of the  
sure ways of keeping these peo-  
ple away."

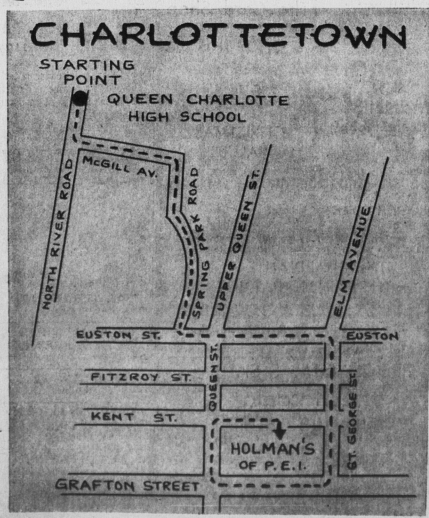
