The port of Vancouver, British Columbia, is fast progressing to a first rank. Three years ago it was made a customs port of entry, and comparing the statistics of trade in the years ending June 30th, 1888, and June 30th, 1890, shows remarkable increases are shown: The value of imports and exports increased from \$834,439 to \$1,183,905, the number of vessels inwards and outwards from 1,523 to 2,783, and the tonnage from 821,035 tons to 1,624,052 tons, while the value of goods entered for consumption rose from \$50,519 to \$210,516. In four years the population of Vancouver has increased from nothing to 15,000.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Ottawa Notes.

Ottawa, Aug. 22.

The Scotch farmers' delegates sailed yesterday for Canada under Dominion auspices, to see the crops of Manitoba and the Territories.

Middleton's farewell to the people of Canada is all the talk here. His version of the fur matter has created a profound sensation, and the Grits are already chuckling in anticipation of the capital they expect to make out of it. They are, however, doomed to disappointment.

The secretaries of the Dominion Rifle Association was notified to-day that the team from the man-of-war Bellerophon will not be able to compete for the coming matches. Dr. McEachern, Chief Veterinary Inspector, has just returned from the ranches, District of Alberta. He speaks highly of its prospects.

The Geological Survey is endeavoring to secure fuller and more authentic statistics regarding the mineral output of Canada than has heretofore been possible. Provincial governments will be asked to co-operate.

A Fatal Run.

Reading, Pa., Aug. 22.

Mount Penn gravity railroad mountain route encircles Mount Penn 803 feet above Reading. Cars are taken from the city to the top of the mountain and the returning cars allowed to go down the mountain by gravity by another route to the point of starting. About 10.30 this morning a car containing about 18 passengers was taken from the station to the top of the mountain and when it reached the point where the gravity portion of the road commenced, the engine was detached. The car ran away while the passengers were still on board. The distance to the point of starting was five miles and this was covered by the runaway car in about three minutes. When the car reached the foot of the plane it jumped the track and rolled down a 50 foot embankment landing upside down, with the passengers inside. Four were killed and two injured.

Baptist Convention.

Yarmouth, N. S., Aug. 22.

The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces opens in the temple here to-morrow morning, and already there are in the vicinity of 300 delegates in town. This afternoon the annual meeting of the Women's Baptist Missionary Union was held. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Manning, Halifax; 1st Vice President, Mrs. Parsons, Halifax; 2nd Vice President, Mrs. G. O. Mates, St. John; 3rd Vice President, Mrs. John Clarke, P. E. Island; Treasurer, Mrs. B. Smith, Amherst; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. John March, St. John. The Executive Committee are about the same as last year.

Frost in Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Aug. 22.

After many close calls, Manitoba got a touch of frost last night. There were two degrees of frost in Winnipeg, and this was general throughout the Province. The damage to late grain will, of course, be considerable, but the great bulk of wheat is either harvested or sufficiently matured to resist the frost.
