

Construction Begins Of New Bridge At Murray River

The J. H. England Construction Company has begun the construction of the new bridge at Murray River to replace the present bridge which is considered too narrow for present day traffic. The new bridge will have a shorter span, 115 feet approximately, owing to the building out of the approaches on both sides. It will be 32 feet in overall width with a 24-foot roadway and a 5-foot sidewalk, which will be raised on both sides. The old bridge had a span of approximately 200 feet with a 15-foot roadway and a 4-foot sidewalk. The bridge will have a creosoted pile understructure, steel girders and cement top.

The construction company hopes to have the bridge completed within six to eight weeks, and during that time the traffic has been diverted via the Murray River mill pond where each of the narrow spans has been made into a single roadway, and a post railing with steel guard rail has been erected. This roadway will be closed during the construction of the bridge and the travelling public are asked to use caution when approaching this dam and to watch the lights before going past them as the road becomes too narrow for two cars to pass.

The bridge being replaced was built in 1919. A Mr. Ferry from the western part of the Province was foreman.

MONTAGUE PLANT DESTROYED

A fire of unknown origin destroyed the vulcanizing plant of Alex MacDougall at Montague yesterday morning. Mr. MacDougall was working outside when the fire began in the back shop where the tires were located. Heavy black smoke soon began to bill up from the building, and a few minutes later the building was a mass of flames.

The fire department arrived in seconds after the sound of the alarm at approximately 11 a.m. D.T. In less than an hour they had the stubborn blaze under control and had prevented it from burning two other buildings which were attached to the vulcanizing plant.

The building was owned by Mr. Frank Greene, Sr. Mr. MacDougall lost all his valuable equipment and stock, including the vulcanizer and a new air pressure unit.

Soviet Farm Delegation May Visit Canada, Mexico

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Soviet farm delegation now visiting the United States took steps Tuesday to broaden its visit to Canada and Mexico.

Vladimir Matskevich, head of the group, flew to Washington from the midwestern United States where the Russians have been touring, to be on hand to help make arrangements for any extension that may develop.

The Canadian embassy said, however, it had received no application from Matskevich. Officials added there is no objection to having the Russians visit Canada to watch the wheat harvest which starts in about three weeks.

Canadian embassy officials said entry permits could be issued as quickly as necessary.

The Mexican embassy said it was informed the Soviet embassy in Mexico City requested permission for the Russians to visit Mexico.
