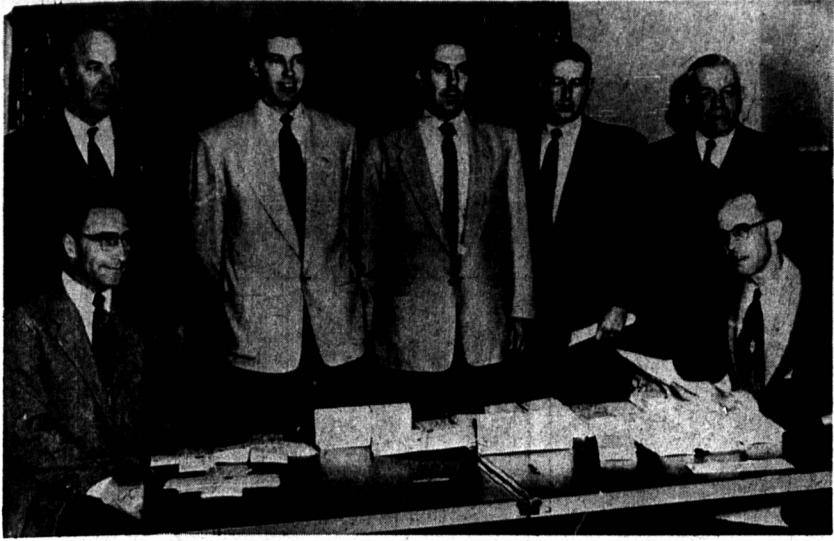

### Address to the Graduates

"Your training has prepared you to be more than efficient starched operators," said Dr. MacVicar in addressing the graduating class. "Implicit but not always mentioned, is the warmth of the presence of Florence Nightingale and the courage of Edith Cavell. He reminded the nurses that 'sick people expect you to have the 'know how', but desire and look for an extra warmth which the layman cannot give. They expect courage and warmth without recognizing what these qualities really are, though realizing them when they are absent.' 'The nurse who cannot furnish these qualities,' said Dr. MacVicar, 'can do great harm to the healing process in the patient's body, besides estranging her from the patient. Such nurses may wonder afterwards why they feel dissatisfied, or why the patient disliked them.' He pointed out that unless they take time in a humble and often soul searching way, they become bitter and

deceived by the exercise of your cunning and talent; it may often be unrewarded and even unnoticed, though it has alleviated a situation."

**Heavy Responsibility**

The great responsibility of the supervisor or superintendent was forcibly portrayed by Dr. MacVicar when he pointed out that no matter how severe the reprimand that was given to the undergraduate the blame of her mistakes still rested on the shoulders of those in charge over them. He reminded the graduates that it was not an easy matter to maintain serenity when it is necessary to assume responsibility for the mistakes of others.

"By graduating, you have become figures of power," said Dr. MacVicar, but reminded them that they must accept that power, first as a power and then as a privilege. "Many people do not know the power they have, or where it lies or how to use it," said he. The Doctor advised the nurses that power without humility was tyranny and humility without desire for further knowledge was vanity.

In conclusion Dr. MacVicar stated, "The best part of your life is just beginning. Some of you will go on to post-graduate work; some of you to staff work, some to private duty and some to marriage. The status nurse will always follow you, even if you never practice professionally again. You will always be expected to show your special talents when emergencies arise and deal with them with the ability you can now show. I enjoyed knowing you and I am sure you will continue to learn."
