SELF-ICED SPICE CAKE

Mix and sift 3 times, 2 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 2 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 2 1/4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon, 1/4 tsp. each of ground cloves, ginger, allspice, nutmeg and mace; mix in 1/2 c. washed and dried seedless raisins and 1/4 c. chopped walnuts. Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine and blend in 1 1/4 c. lightly-packed brown sugar; beat in 3 well-beaten egg yolks and 1/4 tsp. vanilla. Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with 1/2 c. milk and spread batter in 9" square pan, which has been greased and the bottom lined with greased paper. Beat stiff, not dry, 3 egg whites and a few grains salt; gradually beat in 1 c. lightly-packed brown sugar and spread over cake; sprinkle with 1/2 c. chopped walnuts and bake in a rather slow oven, 325°, 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours; cover lightly with brown paper for last half hour.
