**Canadian Ass'n
of Consumers
Holds Meeting**

A meeting of the Canadian Association of Consumers was held last evening in the Council Chamber of City Hall.

Mrs. J. A. Lawson, provincial president, presided and gave an interesting report of the annual meeting of the National Association held in Ottawa late in September. The Island was well represented at the convention — Mrs. Mary Fullerton, Miss Gertrude Love and Mrs. Lawson from Charlottetown, and Mrs. G. S. Inman from Montague, were present.

Last evening at City Hall a number of matters of local interest were brought up and discussed. A letter was read from the newly-formed P. E. I. Chicken Canners Association asking the women for their opinion on a contemplated change in the size of a can of chicken to be manufactured (the canners propose making this change because of the appearance on the Canadian market of chicken canned in the United States and put up in 5 oz. tins. Consumers are warned to watch for this and

compare values, ounce for ounce). The women were unanimous in their vote against the suggested can to contain 4 oz. net contents. They agreed that they favoured the present 7 oz. can and hoped the canners would continue to put it up. A 4 oz. can would definitely be of little or no use to the ordinary household and the general opinion was that the canners would make a great mistake to put it on our markets.

A letter was voted to go from the meeting to the local manager of Canada Packers asking that he look into the price being charged by local grocers for the 1-2 lb. can of Maple Leaf Ham, put up by Canada Packers in Toronto. It dairy boards. Why should only inches around the middle.
