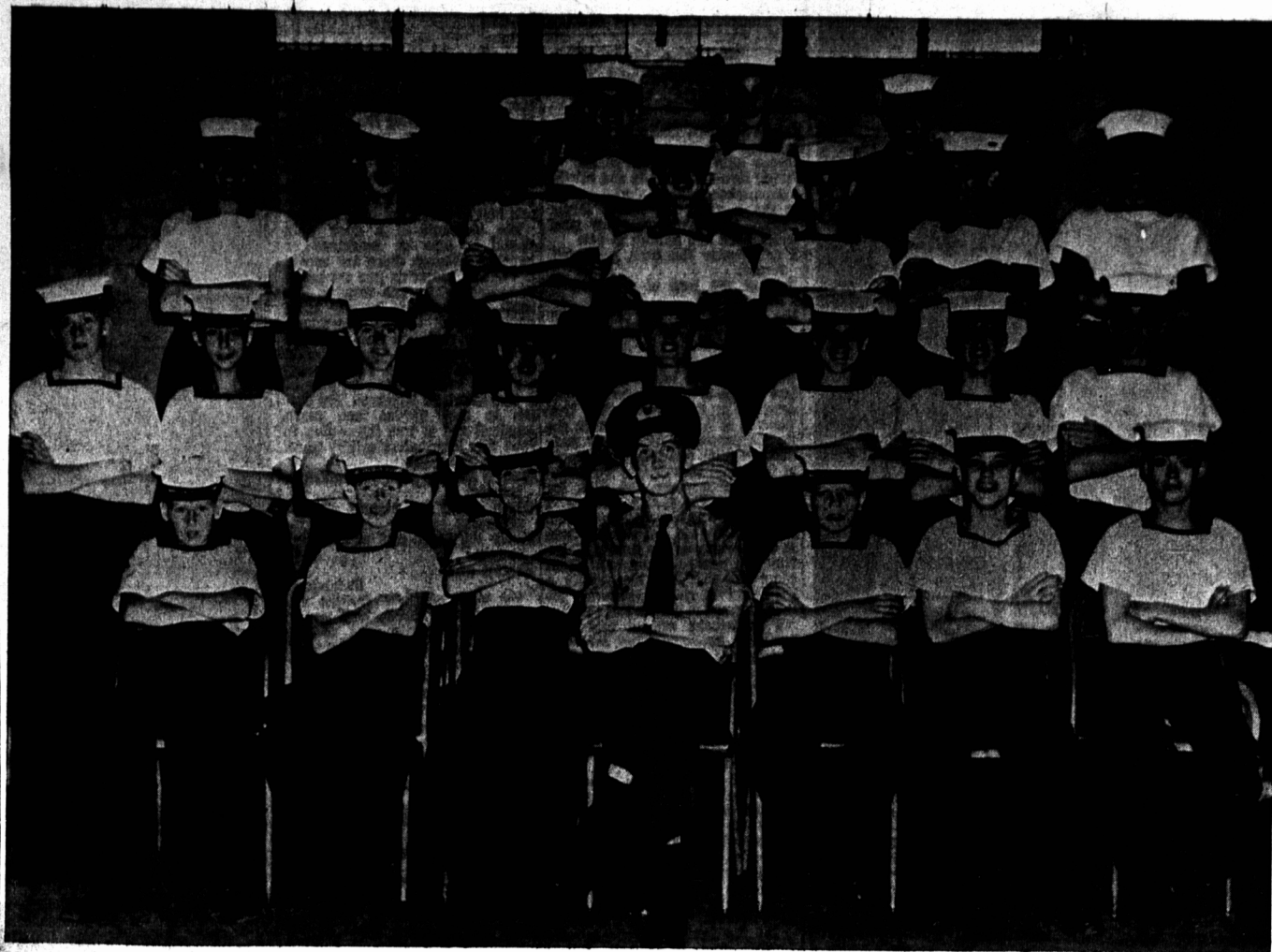


Doyle Wins Open Horseshoe Title

Maritimers Do Well At Track And Field Meet

TORONTO (CP)—Wes Santee, whose ambition is to break the four-minute barrier for the mile, won his specialty Monday in the slow time of 4:06.6 at the Canadian Interprovincial track and field championships.

Santee ran the rest of the mile into the ground and finished with a lap in front of Dick Carmichael of Toronto. Santee's time set a meet record but was two seconds slower than the Canadian native record of 4:04.6 set by Rich Ferguson of Toronto in the 1954 British Empire Games.

Arnie Sowell, of the University of Pittsburgh, and holder of the world's 800-yard record, set his own pace to win in 1:55.4. Sowell's record of 1:46.4 was set earlier this year.

MARITIME WINNERS Maritime athletes did well in other events run off Monday. Diane Matheson of Moncton, N.B. won the women's 100-yard open in 10.9, after taking the 100-yard closed event in 11 seconds. In the open event she was followed to the wire by Sue Burnett, Victoria and Jean Reid, Hamilton.

Joe Mullins of Halifax won the 800 yards closed in 1:55.6, with Peter Watson of HMCS Cornwallis second.

Jim Warner of Halifax competed in two finals. He was second to Jack Parrington of Toronto in the 220 yards closed, and finished third in the 100-yard open.

WORLD ACE BEATEN Warner was the first Canadian to past the wire in the exciting 100-yard open, in which Jim Golliday of Northwestern University was nipped at the tape by Elmer Coleman of Detroit Athletic Club. Golliday is co-holder of the world 100-yard record in 9.6 seconds. Coleman finished in 9.6 to equal the Canadian open record shared by four others.

In the one-mile relay, closed, Nova Scotia finished second to Ontario. In the women's 440-yard relay, closed, Quebec finished third to Ontario and Alberta. Dave Lucas of Halifax was second in the closed hop, step and jump. This event was won by Jim Aitken of Winnipeg, who covered 43 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Halifax Team Cops NS-PEI Ladies Softball Crown

The Halifax Chipettes, Nova Scotia ladies softball champions, took the N. S., P.E.I. crown, in two straight games by defeating the Summerside Capitol Stars 7-4 at the Summerside Airport on Sunday afternoon and 5-0 at Queen Elizabeth Park on Monday morning.

The locals outthit the visitors in the opening game, eleven to nine but could not deliver in the clutch and left a total of 17 stranded on the sacks. Capitol Stars had more errors, six to four for the Chipettes and a wild pitch, three passed balls and an apparent state of suspended animation on the part of the Star defence allowed three unearned runs in the third inning, enough to win the ball game.

In the nine bingles which Marie Peters allowed there were two triples and a double. All the eleven Capitol Star hits off Marie Peters were singles. Carmen Smith relieved Peters in the ninth but did not give up any hits, but two errors accounted for a run. Marie Peters led both clubs in hitting, getting 3 for 5.
