

Miss Stuart At Bedeque Hears N.S. Deaconess

BEDEQUE — More than 225 United Church Women from all parts of the province assembled for an autumn rally in Bedeque church, Saturday afternoon. The highlight was a challenging address given by Miss Ruth Stuart, deaconess at Brunswick Street United Church in Halifax. Her theme was "A more excellent way."

Out of 12 years experience, Miss Stuart gave a vivid description of the great needs of people living in the slum areas of Halifax and how she, as a representative of the church, is seeking to meet these needs.

Miss Stuart stressed the fact that Christ died not only for the respectable, but for the alcoholic, the prostitute, the unmarried mother, the illegitimate child, the aged, the neglected. She indicated that "we must think of our neighbour with kindness and a spontaneous love, and that we must be Christ's hands to do his work in the world."

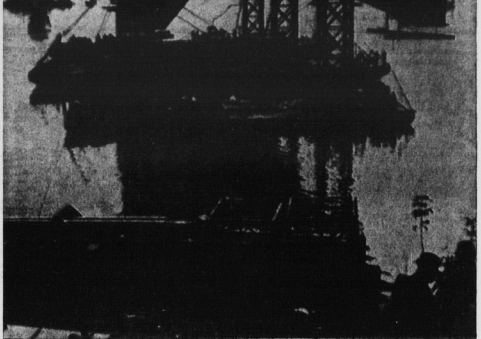
Miss Stuart was introduced by Mrs. Kenneth Parker, Charlottetown and thanked by Mrs. Cecil Webber, Summerside.

Two Vessels Are Loading At Montague

MONTAGUE — Two boats tied up at Montague wharf over the weekend with the Guyard Brothers' ship on Monday morning. She is under the command of Captain Pelletier and will take 600 crates of salmon before sailing to Wood Islands where she will take on 1,000 crates before sailing for Quebec. She is taking the cargo on for Anglo-Canadian and is being loaded by Boatex (P.E.I.) Ltd.

The second boat of 140 gross tons is the cargo of Monroise for Newfoundland. She is under the command of Captain John Jones and will be loaded by George Brookings.

Housing, Feeding To Be Discussed

At the annual meeting Wednesday afternoon of the P.E.I. Tourist Association scheduled for the Charlottetown, the principal topic of discussion will be the problem of housing and feeding the multitude of visitors expected in the province for the 1964 Centennial.

All 15 of the operators are expected to attend to hear Dr. Frank MacKinnon, chairman of the Centennial directors, who will present problems expected to be encountered and plans for meeting them.

Presiding at the meeting will be association president Charles Lewis Summerside, who will open proceedings at 2 p.m. A reception is scheduled for 5 o'clock and a luncheon will be the annual dinner following at 6 p.m.

It was decided by the association directors a review of plans for the big Centennial year was more important to tourist operators than having a guest speaker as usual, so Dr. MacKinnon was invited to attend with his directors and review the situation.

(Continued from page 1) Defence minister for two months before the former Conservative government's election defeat last April, he presented a no-confidence motion alleging that "widespread confusion, unrest and damage" has been caused by piecemeal government pronouncements on the abandonment of defence projects.

The motion listed two projects — a general purpose frigate program, and the plan to convert the RCAP station at Penticton, B.C. — and said abandonment of other projects is contemplated.

The non-confidence motion also criticized the government for having made these decisions without consulting both special Commons defence committee on awaiting its recommendations.

Mr. Churchill said the defence committee has been "out of touch" since its only value had been the testimony of Gen. Charles Foulkes, former chief of the staff committee, that the former Liberal government in 1957 had been advised by the armed services to cancel the Arrow jet interceptor program and the Liberals had decided to postpone a decision until after the 1957 election.

Mr. Churchill said this shows Mr. Helley's "shocking record" of having attacked the Conservative government for the Arrow cancellation — a move on which the Liberals had failed to take action.

He said Mr. Helley's motto has been "Tomorrow, tomorrow and tomorrow."

Harold Winch (NDP—Vancouver) said the Commons defence committee has not been allowed to do the job for which it was appointed — recommending high defence policy.

It was clear that Mr. Helley planned to make his own policy decisions without reference to the committee.

Mr. Winch disagreed with Mr. Churchill's criticism of the cancellation of the frigate construction program.

He said the move would hurt the shipyard, but it was obvious the frigate program was "a vast expenditure of the taxpayers' dollars."

It is feared that a proposed increase could mean the loss of this province's frozen french fries and other frozen products in the United Kingdom.

The conference announced that it plans to raise freight rates 25 per cent on goods shipped from Eastern Canada to effective Jan. 1 of the United Kingdom, a retro date Jan. 15.

Spud Shipments Show Increase

Figures supplied by the markets information section, Canada department of agriculture show that during the period Aug. 1 to Oct. 25 the movement of potatoes from this province was 1,042 carloads compared to 869 carloads for the same period year ago.

Domestic shipments within Canada totalled 909 cars this year, which compares with 466 cars for the same period year ago. There have been 195 carloads of seed exported this year to countries other than the United States. There were only 42 carloads at the same period last year.

The export of tablestock potatoes this year of 38 carloads is 10 carloads more than the 28 carloads exported in the same period year ago.
