6 Accidents Reported; S'side Child Injured

SUMMERSIDE — Four and a half-year-old Sheridan Elliott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Elliott, is in Prince County Hospital with a broken right arm along with lacerations of the face and contusions on the body, after being struck by a car driven by Alan George Murphy of Summerside RR 1 yesterday afternoon.

The accident occurred at approximately 2:45 p.m. on Johnston Street here.

This was one of four accidents investigated by town police over the weekend.

Friday night at approximately 11:30 p.m. a 1953 car driven by Gerald Stewart MacLeod of St. Eleanors was in collision with a 1963 model driven by Roy Jean Louis Lionel of RCAF Summerside. Total damage was estimated to be \$350.

At 5 o'clock last evening police investigated a two-car collision at the Central-Convent Street intersection.

Involved were a 1964 model driven by Douglas Lloyd Murtari of Carleton Place and a

1956 vehicle driven by John Edward Veno of St. Eleanors. The estimated damage was \$300 to the Murtari vehicle and \$500 to Veno's car.

At 6:50 p.m. a 1960 car owned by Paul Joseph Arsenault of Summerside was struck while parked on a service station lot on Notre Dame Street.

Three vehicles were involved in this accident. A three-ton truck driven by Elwin Russ Adams and a 1962 model car driven by Don Alfred Linkletter being the other two vehicles.

Damage to the Arsenault vehicle was \$150, the Adams truck, \$10, and the Linkletter vehicle \$100.

The Borden RCMP investigated two accidents over the weekend.

Saturday afternoon at approximately 2 o'clock they were called to an accident between Breadalbane and Emerald involving cars driven by Joseph Trainor and Albert Rowe, both of Emerald. Total damage was estimated to be \$700.

Sunday morning two later-model vehicles driven by Peter Melver of Newton Road and Linus Mulligan of Kinkora were involved in an accident at Kinkora. Damage was reported as extensive.

Births, Deaths, Marriages Here Decline In '64

OTTAWA — Birth, marriages and deaths all declined in 1964 in Prince Edward Island, compared to 1963 figures, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported.

For the full year, births totalled 2,732 compared to 2,939 in 1963, a drop of seven per cent. Marriages numbered 654 compared to 692, a drop of 5.5 per cent and deaths totalled 974, a decline of 1.1 per cent over 1963 figures.

The P.E.I. figures compare with a Canada-wide decline of 2.4 per cent in births, and eight per cent rise in marriages and a 0.5 per cent drop in deaths.

In December alone, P.E.I. had 223 births compared to 266 in December 1963; 51 marriages compared to 67 and 90 deaths compared to 84 for the corresponding month the year before.

Chualo's History Rags To Riches?

NEW YORK (CP) — Heavyweight George Chualo of Toronto, who earned less than \$3,000 knocking out Doug Jones, gets his rags-to-riches chance for fame tonight when he meets Floyd Patterson in a 12-round bout that could lead to an eventual world title shot for the winner.

Chualo and Patterson both are in magnificent shape after long training grinds and both spent the weekend in seclusion awaiting the weigh-in at noon. They meet in the ring shortly after 10 p.m. local time.

The outwardly stolid Canadian and his general manager, Irving Ungerman, a Toronto businessman, motored from Monticello, N.Y., Saturday afternoon after completing three weeks of training there and bedded down at a New York City hotel.

LOOKS YOUNGER

Chualo, who looks younger than his 27 years, was feeling the pressure as fight time approached. "I'm a bit on edge and I sometimes get cranky, but that is expected," George said after he wound up his training. He has boxed 184 rounds by official count — his manager said roughly 200.

The Canadian champion has

done up to four miles of roadwork almost every day for the nine weeks of training at Bolton, Ont., and Monticello and his legs, he says, are in great shape.

Ungerman said he wants to

keep Chualo's razor-sharpness right to the time of the fight. "That's what we want," he said. "Now we have to watch George's liquid intake. He consumed a lot of liquids in training and now we have to cut down and start drying him out."

As for the Canadian's chances, Ungerman said Chualo would go all out for a knockout. "We don't want to take any chances with a close decision and have to meet Patterson again. We want the championship."

Ungerman disclosed Chualo got only \$2,700 when he knocked out Jones last Oct. 2 at the garden but the fight was "a stepping stone for us."

Sir Winston Condolence Book At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — An announcement was made by Mayor W. E. Jenkins yesterday that he has arranged with Premier W. R. Shaw to have the book entitled "In Remembrance" placed in the town clerk's office Thursday and Friday, Feb. 4 and 5, during office hours each day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The citizens of the town may register their sympathy over the death of Sir Winston Churchill before the book is forwarded to London, England.

There, it will be placed along with similar books from other Canadian provinces in the Sir Winston Churchill library.

Racial Understanding Plea Carried To West By Vanier

REGINA (CP) — Governor-General Vanier carried a plea for understanding between French and English Canadians into the heart of the prairie provinces today.

He spoke here at an afternoon ceremony marking the beginning of Saskatchewan's year-long celebration of its diamond jubilee — the 60th anniversary of the province's creation and entry into Confederation.

In a 30-minute address, the 76-year-old former soldier and diplomat who is Canada's first French-Canadian governor-general called upon Canadians to "cast aside pettiness, selfishness and intolerance, and substitute understanding, brotherhood and confidence in one another."

There is in Canada a French fact, he said. "This is nothing new."

"We are all strands of the Canadian fabric, and where by ourselves we might well be torn and broken, together we form whole cloth that can retain its strength despite the hardest wear."

This, in sum, is the great lesson of your history as it is also the lesson of Canada's history.

For it must be obvious that the two are so entwined, nation and provinces, that the prosperity of one is almost by definition, the advantage of the other.

The "cancer of unrest" or "Malaise of depression" infecting either the provinces or the nation would surely lead to weakness and possible collapse in the part not infected.

Saturday was a busy day for the 76-year-old general. He began it shortly after 8 a.m. in Ottawa, when he got up to have breakfast, read the morning papers and looked at his mail.

He listened to the radio broadcast of Sir Winston Churchill's funeral and later attended a memorial service for Sir Winston on Parliament Hill.

The Governor-General left Ottawa immediately after the memorial service and arrived here at 4:25 p.m. on an RCAF Yukon aircraft.

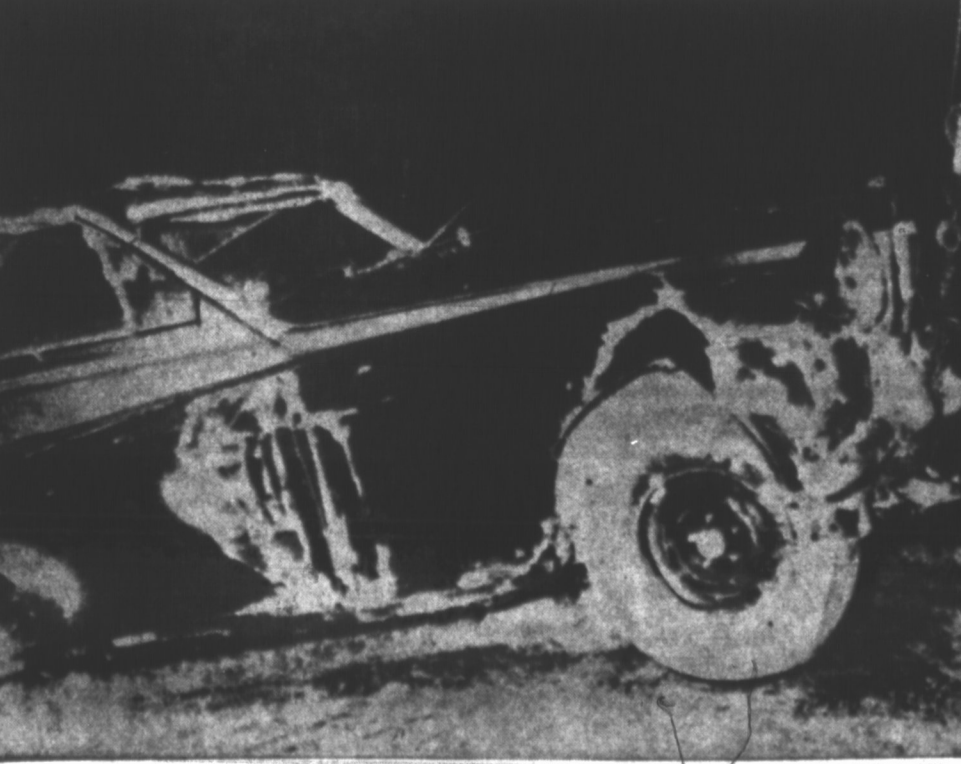

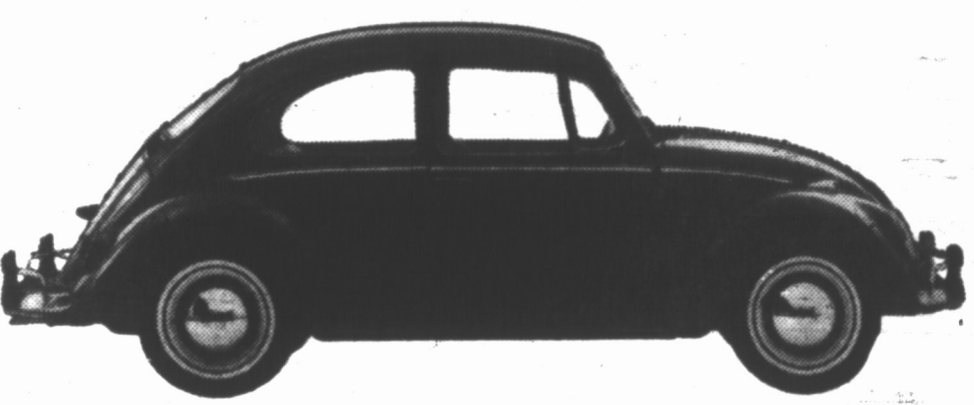
START ON REACTOR

WRECKAGE OF DUKE'S LIMOUSINE

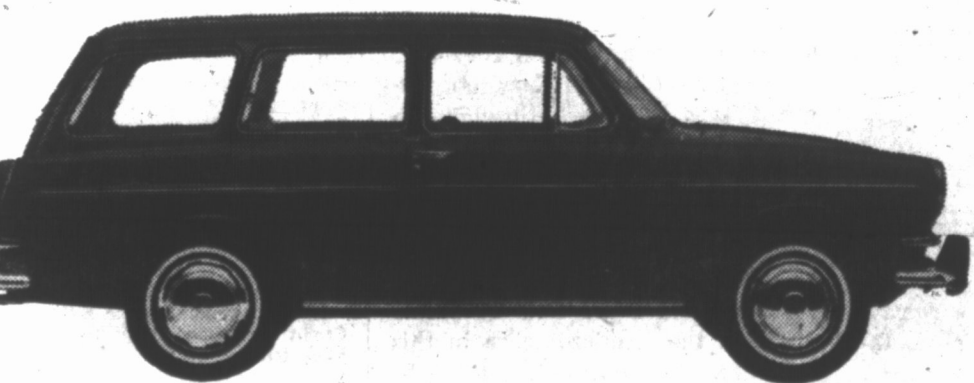
