The Potato Board

While the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada is pending on the validity of Marketing Legislation, the Potato Board, and we feel quite properly so, will carry on business as usual.

The Potato Board is now actively engaged in its advertising and promotional campaign designed to acquaint the buying public with the value and superior quality of the Island product.

We understand it is the intention of the Board to fix and announce in the near future the minimum price for seed potatoes. Such an early announcement will do much to displace the uncertainty which existed in the business during the early fall months last year.

It is quite likely that the prices to be announced will be substantially higher than prevailed last year.

Price Stabilization

Even in biblical days agriculture was advised to prepare in the seven fat years for the lean years to follow. In various countries and under various plans attempts have been made, when prices are high, to hold back a portion to be used in maintaining agricultural income when markets slump.

Such a plan was in effect during the war years in relation to grain in western Canada and the western farmer received during the years after the war substantial rebates on his marketed grains.

Under the Labor Government in New Zealand a price stabilization plan was developed and reserve funds established. Through this plan the New Zealand Dairy Industry has accumulated a cushioning fund of \$59,000,000 and the meat industry \$105,000,000. Such substantial amounts should enable New Zealand farmers to weather some fairly heavy economic gales. Could such a plan have been applied on our potato crop during the fat years, the industry would have been in a far more secure position during the past two years.

Federation Meetings

Federation director has always considered public meetings a valuable means of informing members on activities and policy and what is equally important learning the viewpoint and hearing the criticisms of the members. In the near future four such meetings are planned, of which due announcement will be made, for Eldon, Fort Augustus, Brookfield and Bedouque.

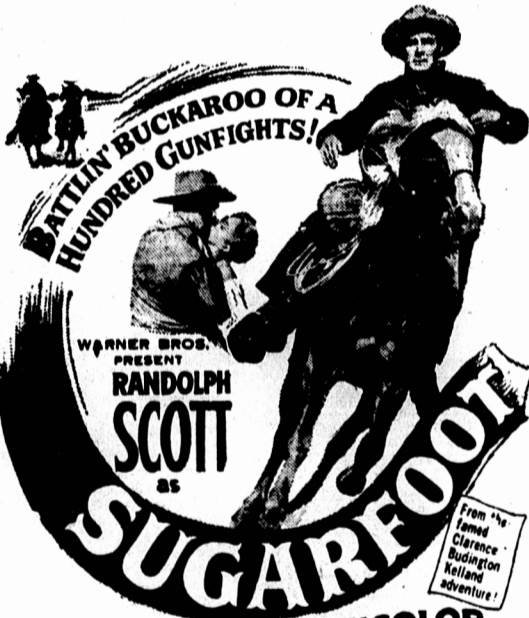

WINNIPEG, Aug. 30 — (CP) — Grain prices today showed a firm trend on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange under buying stimulated by continued rains in the prairie grain belt.
