The Gilchrist Scholarship examinations are now in progress at Halifax. There are three candidates, Graham Creelman, M. Gregory, and Humphrey Mellish. Mr. Mellish is a brother of Professor Mellish, of this city, and a graduate of Delhousie College, Halifax.

MR. AND MRS. ALFRED TENNYSON are spending the summer at Farringford. It is rumored that the great poet will give up his beautiful Isle of Wight home when the railroad is extended from Newport to Yarmouth and Freshwater, which will be soon.

LAUNCHED.—On the 21st inst., from the shipyard of Mr. W. Richards, of Biddeford, lot 12, a barque of about 800 tons, called the "Label," copper fastened, and to class A1, 10 years at Lloyd's, intended for the southern trade. This vessel will be fitted with iron masts, and all modern improvements, and is considered by competent judges to be one of the best vessels built on this Island.

A PROFITABLE ROAD.—According to the Pioneer Press, which claims to speak officially, the forthcoming annual report of the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway for the year ending, June 30th, will show gross earnings of over \$9,000,000, being an increase of \$2,500,000 over last year. The net earnings will show a surplus of \$1,500,000 after paying all expenses, interests, and a dividend of 8 per cent. per annum on capital stock.

The Moonlight Excursion, this evening, under the auspices of Witley Lodge, I. O. O. F., promises to be a very enjoyable one. The steamer "Princess of Wales" will leave the Steamboat Wharf, at 8.15 p. m., and return at eleven p. m. The services of Galbraith's Band have been secured for the occasion, and Mr. Collins, steward of the steamer will provide a first-class refreshment table. Every one desirous of having a good time should attend.

DIED ON THE STEAMER FALMOUTH.—Among the passengers on board the steamer Falmouth, of the International line, when she left Portland, Me., on Monday evening, were Mr. and Mrs. J. Avery Brown, of Halifax, N. S. Mrs. Brown appeared in her usual health, and after taking supper returned to her state room, saying she would lie down for a short time. Soon after it was found that she was dead. The lady, it appears, was subject to heart disease, and it was this that caused her death.—St. John Telegraph.

Attorney General Sullivan

And Chief Justice Palmer

ADDRESS THE JURY.

MANSLAUGHTER THE VERDICT.

SUMMERSIDE, June 22.

Attorney-General Sullivan forcibly replied to Mr. Hodgson on behalf of the Crown, and afterward Chief Justice Palmer delivered his charge to the Jury. At seven o'clock the Jury retired, and about midnight they returned to ask further instructions from His Lordship. The tenor of their questions showed that they hesitated between a verdict of murder and manslaughter. In several instances, prisoner's counsel objected to ruling of Court, and points of Law were discussed. Shortly after one o'clock, the Jury returned to the Courtroom with a verdict of manslaughter. The verdict seems to give general satisfaction.

A Royal Engagement.

BERLIN, June 22.

It is rumored that Prince Waldemar, of Denmark, will shortly be engaged to the Princess Victoria of Germany.

A Settlement to Land Question.

DUBLIN, June 22.

Healy, in an address to the electors of Monaghan, said that the creation of an occupying proprietary would finally settle the much-vexed Irish land question.

PARIS, June 22.

The trial of Louis Michel for inciting pillage has begun here.

Floods in Germany.

BERLIN, June 22.

The floods are doing much damage in Silezia and other parts of Germany. The Danube is rising fast.

A Crown Grant Refused.

CHRISTIANA, June 22.

The Norwegian Parliament has refused to increase the Crown Grant, alleging, as a reason, the unsettled political situation of the country.

The Methodist Conference.

TORONTO, June 22.

The Methodist Conference of Toronto has adopted the basis of Union.

Telegraph Notes.

Twelve lives are reported lost by the flood last Sunday at Seneca, Kansas.

Ten buildings were burned at Fresno, Cal., on the 20th inst. Loss \$70,000.

Most of the Irish bishops have given a thorough adherence to the Pope's recent manifesto.

Bismarck's condition is worse. He is suffering from violent pains in the stomach. His departure for Friedrichsruhe has been postponed.

Mr. Redmond, who represents the interests of the Irish National League telegraphs that he will send from France £1,000 towards the fund for Mr. Parnell.

In the Commons, the bill providing for the application of £250,000 of the church surplus to aid the Irish sea fisheries, and particularly to provide for harbors, passed its second reading.

Already about thirty suits for damages aggregating about \$750,000, has been commenced against the Board of Bridge Trustees and Corporations of New York and Brooklyn as co-defendants, in consequence of the disaster on the bridge.

The steamship "Arabic," arriving at San Francisco, brought 700 cases of opium, valued at half a million; the duties were a quarter of a million. It is estimated that before July 1st there will be three million dollars worth of opium there.

The Malagasy Embassy, which is now in Paris, will return to London immediately, and will renew their efforts to obtain the help of English opinion in effecting an amicable settlement of the difficulties between France and Madagascar.

Arthur H. Blaine, cashier and head book-keeper of the Massachusetts Loan and Trust Company, under arrest at Boston for embezzling \$44,000 of the Company's funds has confessed the crime, and states that the cause was mining and other stock speculation.

E. L. Stewart, the aeronaut, made an ascension at Fayette, Mo., on the 20th inst., in an old hot air balloon, which burst when it had attained a height of 2,000 feet. The balloon and aeronaut came down with a rush, and plunged into a creek and disappeared. Stewart's body was recovered.

An extensive fire occurred in the Royal Dockyard at Amsterdam, on the 20th inst. The man-of-war "Doggerbaud" was destroyed, and the man-of-war "Kortenaar" was damaged. The loss is between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 florins. A fireman was killed and three other persons injured.

Mr. Healy, who intends to contest the vacancy in the representation of the County Monaghan in the House of Commons, has issued an address in which he says the caution of an occupying proprietary will finally settle the Land question. He says he relies on the Irish party to face the question of purchase into the notice of Parliament.

The arrest of the Polish author, Krz-

zewski, and other persons at Berlin charged with giving information to Russian revolutionists, regarding the movements of Russian troops, will lead to their trial on charges of high treason. Important evidence has been obtained against them. A Polish journalist has handed to the German ambassador at Vienna important papers bearing on the case, which have been forwarded to Bismarck.

Eighty-five per cent. of the creditors of Gaff, Bennett & Co., Pittsburg, Pa., held a meeting on Wednesday, 20th inst., and decided to grant the firm an extension of three years. The liabilities of Gaff, Bennett & Co. are \$1,232,752, and of the Grafton Iron Co. (for which they are responsible) \$330,000. Their personal assets are \$1,169,637, besides which they have real estate worth \$2,500,000. The firm agreed to pay 4 per cent. of their indebtedness during the next six months.

Considerable excitement was created at Amherst, on Wednesday last, by a report in circulation to the effect that a young son of Wm. Atkinson, baggage master I. C. R., was drowned in Lushy's mill pond, a short distance from town. The boy had gone fishing early in the morning with some companions who returned at six o'clock reporting him drowned. Quite a crowd gathered and accompanied the father to the pond. After some time it was ascertained that the boy had strayed away during the afternoon and was safe in town.

Maton's block, on Post street, San Francisco, occupied by O'Connor & Moffat's dry goods store and the Olympic Club, was burned on Wednesday last. The fire was the most disastrous that has occurred since the great lumber fire two years ago, for the fire seemed to be entirely unable to check the flames. The building has long been known as a tinder box. Insurance companies rated it extra hazardous. At five o'clock the flames were under control, but the upper stories were a complete wreck. The building was valued at \$150,000; O'Connor & Moffat's stock at \$50,000; the Olympic Club's property at \$40,000. The loss is estimated at \$507,000.
