Pole Beans Riding High In Casserole With Tuna

Have you noticed those king-sized snap beans in the markets these days? They're pole beans, and during the winter almost all that are available come from Dade County, Fla., very near the Miami airport.

SOUTH AMERICAN TOMATO CHEESE STEW
1 (2 1/2 lb.) can juicy tomatoes
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. ground mustard
1 pt. whole milk
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1 1/2 c. small-diced cheddar cheese
Sizzling hot croutons
In 1 1/2 qt. saucepan, combine tomatoes and seasonings; simmer 15 min. Meantime, in second 1 - qt. saucepan, scald milk and pour into beaten eggs. Add soda and cheese to tomato and stir - heat. When cheese melts, combine the 2 mixtures stirring constantly until bubbles form around edge, but do not let it boil. Serve at once in small bowls. Garnish: croutons.

POLE BEAN AND TUNA CASSEROLE
1 1/2 lb. pole beans
3/4 c. coarse-chopped peeled fresh onion
6 pimento stuffed olives sliced
3 tbsp. butter or margarine
3 tsp. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
1-4 tsp. basil leaves crumbled
1 small section peeled garlic, crushed
1/2 tsp. oregano leaves
2 tsp. chopped parsley
1 1/2 c. milk
2 (7 oz.) cans tuna, drained and flaked coarse
1 tsp. paprika
Snip ends from beans. Cut beans into 1 1/2" pieces and cook uncovered in 1" boiling water 5 min. Cover; boil 15 min. or until beans are crisp - tender.
