The government of Premier Santiago Casares, fulfilling threats to use firm measures to restore normal conditions, ordered workers' centres closed in Lebrisa in Sevilla Province, and arrested members of the strike committee, meanwhile declaring a general strike "illegal." The Associated Press learned the government was seriously contemplating assumption of control over all Spanish railways to bring an end to recurring interruptions of service caused by strikes and other labor difficulties.

Satin Moth Found In Large Numbers On Trees In City
Pest, Which Is Destructive To Poplars & Willows, Makes Spraying Necessary This Summer.

A survey of the poplar and willow trees in and around Charlottetown has been made by Dr. J. A. Clark, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, accompanied by Mr. R. P. Gorham, entomologist at the Station. On advice of the entomologist, the city is starting spraying against the Satin Moth, which was found yesterday in large numbers on the above mentioned trees.

Dr. Clark reports, reassuringly, that a large number of parasites of the Satin Moth were also found; so that while it will be necessary to spray this year to prevent serious injury, it is expected in the near future that the parasites will prevent this insect from destroying our poplar and willow trees.

Method of Spraying

The caterpillars of the satin moth are now practically all out of their winter hiding places and the early ones have completed their first skin moult. To be effective spraying for control should be done at once, covering the leaves with an arsenical coating. Dr. Clark advises that a pound of lead arsenate to one hundred gallons of water is recommended. The addition of 1 1/2 pints of fish oil to the mixture helps to stick the material to the polished leaves of poplar and willow. The insects are very hard to destroy after they become large.

Of European Origin

The following history and description of the Satin Moth, furnished by the Dominion Entomological Laboratory, Fredericton, N.S., will also be read with interest:

The satin moth is an European insect which found its way into America some twenty years ago. It has been in parts of Westmorland and Kings counties, N.B. since 1920, the heaviest infestation occurring around Moncton, N.B. It has spread into the western end of Cumberland County, N.S. Small infestations have also been found in Annapolis County, N.S.

The caterpillars feed on poplar and willow, preferring the introduced species such as are commonly planted in towns. They are generally noticed during the latter part of June when they are approaching their full size and beginning to strip the trees of their foliage. About this time, if very numerous, they cause a great deal of inconvenience by crawling over gardens and houses. If trees are completely defoliated two years in succession they will generally begin to die back.

The full-grown caterpillars are about an inch and a half long, with a black back and grey sides. A row of large white marks is arranged down the back and tufts of reddish brown hairs on tubercles of the same colour in rows down the back and sides. They pupate on the trees, or on walls, fences, etc. In July and the moths come out in about ten days. The moths are white with satin-like wings and lay eggs in whitish masses, mostly on the bark. These hatch in August and the small larvae feed for a short time before spinning webs in crevices on the tree where they hibernate. They do not do much damage until they emerge in the spring and start feeding.

A thrilled Charlottetown audience at the Forum last night saw the Stellarton Draegermen, heroes of the Moose River gold mine rescue, do their work.

The Draeger Corps was introduced by Mr. James White, rescue superintendent. They were welcomed to Charlottetown by His Worship Mayor Turner. In the course of a brief address His Worship re-called the Moose River rescue and paid a high tribute to the outstanding heroes of that epic drama whose success brought thanksgiving to so many.

The program opened with a parade of Draegermen, Scotch lassies and pipers around the Forum. After the introduction of the miners and the address of welcome the Draeger corps gave a demonstration of first aid work showing artificial respiration and the different methods of bandaging employed for various injuries.

The interesting demonstration was followed by selections by the P. E. I. Highlanders Pipe Band and the Canadian Legion band.

Then came a re-enactment of the Moose River rescue. A timber casing was erected in the Forum to represent the rescue tunnel, the main shaft, and a portion of the 141 foot level where the men were entombed. With lights out and only the beams of the miners' lamps showing, the men worked their way down the narrow tunnel, passing back the rocks and debris.
