Gaza Strip, U.S. Budget, UK Cabinet In Limelight

The United Nations tackled the explosive issue of the Gaza Strip. The Afro-Asian bloc pressed in the General Assembly a resolution that would give Israel five days to get out.

Canada and several other countries worked hard for a solution that would replace Israeli forces with United Nations, rather than Egyptian, authority. Under this plan UN troops would take over the Gaza Strip, a small wedge of territory on the Mediterranean which was part of Palestine originally.

The most striking promotion was that of Peter Thornycroft, who stepped up from the presidency of the Board of Trade, a government department, to chancellor of the exchequer, Macmillan's old job. This makes him one of the big three in the cabinet.

PEARSON ACTIVE
External Affairs Minister Pearson was playing a key role in the drive to get the UN to assert its authority on behalf of both sides in the dispute, rather than as an agent for merely getting the Israelis out and the Egyptians back in.

BRITISH CABINET
The surprises in the cabinet list of Prime Minister Macmillan were contained not in the new faces it brought to the forefront, but in the old hands who were kept on.
