

The hon. Attorney General, from the Special Committee appointed to report on Private Bills, and to whom was referred the Bill to incorporate Societies for the sale and distribution of Seed Grain on credit, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House a report of said Committee, which was agreed to by the House.

The Bill to incorporate Societies for the sale and distribution of Seed Grain on credit, was then read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole, to take into consideration the said Bill.

Mr. ARSENAULT.—I have no new settlements societies will be formed, and therefore I think nine members a sufficient number to begin with. I move that the blank be filled up with the word nine.

Hon. Mr. McALLAN.—I move that the words "intend to contribute" be struck out.

Mr. GREEN.—I am not sure that this amendment would have a bad effect, and be the means of causing a man to be expelled from the Society, and therefore I do not intend to propose it.

Mr. ARSENAULT.—Some years ago the people who have formed these societies were obliged to go fifteen or twenty miles for seed, and even then they had to give a bushel of grain for the seed, and therefore I think it is better to have a clause in the Bill, which would allow them to get their seed from the Society, and to be repaid for it.
